



Around the Council Table
 Legion drum corps was voted \$400 from the city's promotion fund to assist the corps in financing a trip to the American Legion convention in Oakland next week. The corps will play at a number of cities en route.
 Council meetings will be held on the second and fourth Tuesday evenings of each month at 7:45 o'clock instead of first and third Tuesday, as soon as an ordinance to this effect is adopted. The ordinance was introduced this week and is scheduled for final passage at the next regular meeting, August 16. The next meeting of the council will be held Tuesday, August 9, at which time the question of filling the vacancy on the council caused by the death of Dr. Steiner will be discussed.
 A request from the Young People's Society of the Episcopal church for the loan of a city truck was referred to the committee on public works.
 A communication was read from the American Legion asking that a supervisor be appointed for the school playgrounds for the remainder of the vacation period. It was referred to committee.
 Councilman Ludlow outlined the procedure for those seeking contributions from the city promotion fund—stating that such requests should be made first to the Chamber of Commerce, which body would in turn send its recommendations to the council.
 A request to move temporary houses now in use at Olympic Village to a location on Dominguez street, opposite the Pacific Electric shops, was referred to committee for further information.
 During the meeting, Councilman Wright was excused on account of illness and was taken home by Fireman Ed Little. Mr. Wright was suffering from a weak heart, but was feeling well enough again this morning to be out.

Compton Invites Supervisors To Visit Warehouse
Veterans Relief Association Asks Board to Look Over Its Work
 Members of the county board of supervisors today have an invitation to visit the headquarters of the Compton Cooperative Relief Association, formally tendered the governmental body late yesterday by Postmaster Ed Lewis of the Compton Community Chest.
 The invitation was accepted on behalf of the supervisors by Supervisor John R. Quinn of the fourth district, embracing Compton, and it was indicated that he and Supervisor Frank L. Shaw, head of the charities department of the county supervisors, will make an unannounced visit some time this week.
 Workings of the organization were explained in detail by Mr. Lewis, and at the conclusion Supervisor Shaw stated that it had been called to his attention by other persons and he was looking forward to a visit to "the warehouse where 700 families, a total of 3677 persons, now are being cared for in Compton, and 1600 outside the city."
 "We are not asking anything on behalf of Compton," Postmaster Lewis said. "We would like to have you send an auditor out to our place, however, and make an official report on the work our organization has been doing."
 "We should like to have you assist us in caring for the 1600 needy persons in county territory outside of Compton, however, because there are certain expenses such as gasoline and repairs for our trucks which gather up our food, clothing and fresh vegetables."
 There now are 22 of these relief stations, all patterned after the Compton organization, in the county, the supervisors were told by a man who had just organized one in Pasadena. Compton was given the credit for having the best-functioning body.

Ask County To Stop Spending Money On Park
Property Owners Want Moratorium On Taxes Pending Settlement
 Request that Los Angeles county refrain from expending any further sums whatever in the development or improvement of Alondra Park, the citizens' committee of the assessment district has filed with the board of supervisors an extended resolution drawn up in an effort to obtain relief for the property owners.
 The resolution asks that the delinquent taxes be not respaid over the assessment district this year, but that a moratorium be granted pending remedial legislation. Also, it is requested that the supervisors cooperate with the property owners in working out some plan of temporary relief, until some legislative action may be obtained to relieve this oppressive situation under the Mattoon Act. Signatures attached to the resolution are those of Robert Robertson, president; A. A. Bamford, secretary; George C. Wurzburg, E. A. Chamberlin, Beverly B. Smith, Charles A. Hale, J. D. Adams, John Salm, Oliver B. McDowell and Ella M. F. Atchley.
 Endorsement of the committee's action has been given by the Gardena city council, the Torrance city council and Redondo Beach. The Edison company, owner of 200 acres within the assessment district, stated that it would remain neutral in the matter, as it was not their policy to take sides in any matter of this kind.
