Quinn Goes On Record Against a Tax Rate Increase

Supervisor John R. Quinn today went definitely on record against any increase in the present tax rate of 85c per hundred-dollar assessed valuation.

In a public statement, Supervisor Quinn stated, "In government as in private affairs, there are days for retrenchment. County government must be returned to a basis of old-fashioned frugality."

"Assessed valuations on all kinds of property have been materially reduced. It is estimated that the total reduction will approximate 30 per cent. I am unalterably opposed to, and will vote against any increase in the prevailing tax rate so that taxpayers will be given the benefit of the reduction represented by decrease in assessed valuations."

Santa Monica Bond Issue Bought By Bank of America

The Bank of America has bought the entire bond issue of \$600,000, voted by the people of Santa Monica to finance the building of a 2000-foot breakwater, creating a small-boat harbor for that city. The deal was consummated at the city hall, Santa Monica, yesterday, the bank paying par and accrued interest. These bonds are amortized over a period of 38 years and bear five per cent interest. There were no other bidders.

Dr. A. H. Giannini, chairman of the bank's general executive committee, in commenting on this bond purchase, said:

"The advertising campaign of the Bank of America urging people to deposit their money in the time-tested banks of the state, that idle money might be put to work for California, has met with such hearty support that the Bank of America is now translating words into action."

"We believe that the bottom of the depression has been reached and that a reasonable optimism as to the future is justified. The first thing we must do is to put men at work, and these break-water bonds will do that. This purchase is further evidence of our firm belief that California can lead the nation to sound prosperity."

LIQUID FIRE

From medieval battlements boiling oil was poured down upon attacking hosts; a quaint old custom that must have added zest to living in that day—for those who poured the oil.

Boiling oil also was used to inflict torture upon other sufferers, but sufferers who accepted this treatment of their own free will so that they might have a chance to live. That was in an early day of surgery. Boiling oil was used, as were glowing hot rods, to sear wounds and stop the flow of blood. It was boiling oil, red hot rods, or death; one had his choice when surgery was needed.

Since that early day surgery has made tremendous strides. Today pain is given but minor consideration by those who must sleep for a brief period under the surgeon's knife. The elimination of pain from surgery is but one advance.

Medical science through the ages has progressed so far in an understanding of the dangers that formerly lurked unknown in the operating rooms of a day gone by, that now fear of surgery is nearly dissipated for those with some knowledge of modern surgical methods.

Surgical dangers today are practically negligible in a great number of operations themselves. The skilled surgeon knows precisely what he is doing. Antisepsis prevents infection.

However, danger does exist today, and will continue to exist, just so long as the patient will allow a definite condition to develop to the danger point before

obtaining competent medical advice—and then acting upon his advice.

Anesthesia and antisepsis are developments of medical science. Together they form possibly the greatest boon ever given to suffering humanity. Anesthesia gives sleep instead of pain. Antisepsis prevents what not so many years ago spelled death by infection in the great majority of even simple operations. That was in a day when bacteriology was unknown as a science.
