A curtain raiser to the main game will be played between the Torrance Night Hawks and Nea's Chiroproctors of Long Beach. This game will start promptly at 7 o'clock, the league game to follow as soon as it is ended.

The Bluebirds took their last two games, beating Westminster 7 to 4 on Friday and Whittier 9 to 8 here on Tuesday. Tomorrow's game closes the league season and in fourth place, close behind Olive, whose last two games have been postponed. Due to the unfortunate career of the Bluebirds in the first half of the league series, the Torrance team will probably place fifth in the combined percentage, which is not at all bad considering that the team did not really get going until the second half was well started.


