Bluebirds Wind Up Second Half In Second Place

The Torrance Bluebirds finished the season in a blaze of glory by defeating the Long Beach Acorns, 15 to 3. Not that this game in itself was such an exploit, as the Acorns have been kicked around and stepped on by almost every team in the league during the second half, to the extent that they have won only one game in 14 starts.

The glory for the Bluebirds consisted in the fact that they cleaned up in the last four starts and finished the half tied with Olive and Santa Ana for second place.

The play-off series between Santa Ana and Anaheim started Tuesday evening, August 16. Seven games are scheduled, the winner of four to be declared the champion for the season.

Miss Aileen Givens, owner of the grounds where the games are played, has enclosed the grandstand and made other improvements which will add to the comfort of the patrons. She has taken over the business and retains Ray Townsend as manager of the ball team.

Beginning last Sunday she has inaugurated a new policy in regard to admissions, and a small admission fee is now being charged to see the games from the grandstand. As baseball has been popular in Torrance for the past ten years, during which the managers of the various teams have built up a considerable attendance under the old policy of taking up a voluntary collection, the new arrangement has stirred up some comment among those who are regular attendants, especially since the women fans are not excepted from the payment of the entrance fee.

The support of the business men, who have in past years contributed liberally to the support of a winning ball team, has also been withdrawn since the games are now more or less on a strictly commercial basis.

Two games have been scheduled for the Torrance Night Hawks in the next few days. The team will meet the Consolidated Lumber outfit Friday night at the local ball park, and on Wednesday of next week will play the Redondo Garage, one of the fastest clubs of the beach city, which has a long string of wins to its credit.

No admission is charged to these games, which are free to the public, but a collection will be taken to defray necessary expenses.

Torrance Entry Places Third In Big Turtle Derby


