Funeral Services Held For Father of Supervisor Quinn

Funeral services for Harry Quinn, 89, father of Supervisor John R. Quinn of the fourth district, embracing Torrance, were held Monday at Porterville. The elder Mr. Quinn died last Friday night at his ranch home near Delano, where he had resided for more than 60 years, death being attributed to natural causes. Mr. Quinn was a widely known farmer and stock raiser of the

San Joaquin valley. He came to California in 1868, after an unsuccessful mining venture in Australia, landing at San Francisco. Surviving the father in addition to the Los Angeles county supervisor are the widow, Mrs. Katie Robertson Quinn, whom he married in 1886, and six other children.

Senator Carter Pleads For Aid Local Industry

Republican Candidate For Congress Gives Forceful Address in Torrance

At a meeting held last Friday night in the auditorium of the Torrance high school, State Senator Henry E. Carter, candidate for the Republican nomination for congress from this, the 17th congressional district, gave a forceful address on various problems confronting the nation today.

Senator Carter urged the enactment of legislation to protect depositors in banks from loss of their savings due to carelessness or mismanagement by bank officials. Fair tariff protection for California products was strongly urged by the senator, who referred to local tariff need, particularly of abalone shells, oil, fish, citrus fruits and numerous other items. The senator cited the serious condition facing the fish industry at the harbor and advised those present that unless drastic tariff actions are immediately brought about, the fish industry in the harbor district will meet certain ruin. Markets for fish mean labor and imports of fish products deprive local labor from benefits from fishing and packing.

The speaker also sounded a warning relative to the attempt being made to move the navy base from San Pedro to San Francisco, which would cause the loss of millions of dollars to this community.

In concluding his address, Senator Carter urged the people to hold to the traditions that have made this nation great and not to yield to those who would tear down when men are needed now to construct.

ORDINANCE NO. 237
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE FIXING THE RATES OF TAXES AND LEVYING TAXES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 1932.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE:

SECTION 1: That for the purpose of raising the sums of money necessary to be raised by taxation upon the taxable property of the city of TORRANCE as a revenue to carry on the various Departments of said City for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1932, the rates of taxes for the different portions of the City of TORRANCE are hereby fixed and taxes are hereby levied on all taxable property in the different portions of said City for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1932, in the number of cents upon each One Hundred Dollars of the assessed value of said property as assessed by the County Assessor and equalized by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, and for the several funds and purposes set forth in the following table, the taxes levied upon property in each portion of said City hereinafter described and designated by a District Number being at the rate set opposite the designations of the respective funds in the column headed by the District Number which is prefixed to the description of such portion of said City as hereinafter stated.

DISTRICT NO. 1: All that portion of the City of TORRANCE included within the boundaries thereof as originally incorporated; DISTRICT NO. 2: All the territory annexed to the City of Torrance at annexation election held December 8, 1925, and known as West Torrance; all that territory annexed to the City of Torrance by annexation election held February 9, 1926, and known as North West Torrance; all that territory annexed to the City of Torrance by annexation election held January 18, 1927, and known as Meadow Park; all that territory annexed to the City of Torrance by annexation election held March 12, 1928, and known as Walteria; all that territory annexed to the City of Torrance by annexation election held September 10, 1929, and known as Heibush Tract; all that territory annexed to the City of Torrance by annexation election held May 26, 1931; and known as South Torrance.

 NOME, Alaska, Aug. 06.—When Frances A. Ross decided to return to the mainland after nine months with the Eskimos of King Island, in Bering Sea, she chose to accompany 21 King Islanders in a skin boat across the 120 miles of dangerous water, rather than accept a ride from the coast guard.

Miss Ross, daughter of Capt. Thomas A. Ross of the coast guard, was the first white woman to visit King Island. She lived among the Eskimos there throughout the winter of 1931-32, returning to Nome this summer. She will sail for Seattle in September to resume her studies at the University of Washington, where she is a senior.

SECTION 3: The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald a weekly newspaper printed, published and circulated in the City of Torrance, and immediately upon its adoption the same shall be in full force and effect.

Crowley Urges Nomination of Frank McGinley

Torrance Man Gives Reasons For His Withdrawal In Other's Favor

William H. Crowley, 2650 Chestnut street, South Torrance, who for the past two months has been acting as campaign manager in

Torrance and Lomita for Frank McGinley, Republican candidate for assemblyman from the 6th district, issues a statement on behalf of his candidate in which he sets out his reasons for withdrawing from the assembly race in favor of Mr. McGinley.

Mr. Crowley says: "My name was submitted and filed as a candidate for the Republican nomination for state assemblyman in the 6th district. When I learned that Frank McGinley had also filed, I immediately withdrew in his favor. It is my earnest desire to see this district properly represented and to avoid a repetition of the disappointing performance of our representative as occurred in the last session. The idea seems to persist that I am still a candidate. In the Municipal League publication of recent issue, my name is still on the list. My friends may rest assured that my name does not appear on the ballot.

"For the past two months I have been acting in the capacity of campaign manager in Lomita and Torrance for Frank McGinley and I will appreciate your consideration of Mr. McGinley.
 "For years I have resided in Torrance and am naturally interested in its industrial development. The experience of the Salm Manufacturing Company in the state legislature is probably well known to all of you, nevertheless it might be well for all of us to remind our neighbors of the performance of our representative in the legislature. Frank McGinley handled the matter in an able manner and kept the plant out of difficulties. Ben Hill was not even present at the session to defend the institution.

Board Eliminates County Patrol of State-Owned Beach

Patrolling of Manhattan and Santa Monica beaches, owned by the state, must be eliminated by Los Angeles county, it was announced today by Supervisor John R. Quinn, in whose area most of the county's coast line lies. The move is necessary, it is explained, due to additional economies necessitated in this year's budget.

Manhattan beach last month was the most popular of all county-maintained public beaches, the board of supervisors was told; nearly 1,000,000 attending in the month. Now it is essential that county life guards be eliminated, Quinn said.

The supervisors agreed to take over operation of the beaches when the state acquired the frontage several years ago in the county. In finding it necessary to slash the recreation camps and playgrounds budget, \$70,000 was lopped off, which included the lifeguard service.


