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

as they are sold, as required. Under the law, all principal payments on the bonds may be deferred for 15 years, and by that time the aqueduct will have been finished, delivering much needed water to consumers and earning a large revenue therefrom.

"Applications for work cannot be received now. Employment offices will be opened when funds are in hand. At that time public announcement will be made."

Old Pump House Burns at Lomita

An old disused pump house belonging to the Palos Verdes ranch located at the south end of Eshelman avenue, Lomita, was destroyed by fire last Thursday. The blaze was discovered about noon. Lomita firemen were called to the scene, but were unable to save the building. The cause of the blaze is thought to have been spontaneous combustion.

Bank Establishes Branch at Needles

The establishment of a branch of the Bank of America at Needles, California, was announced today by Dr. A. H. Giannini, chairman of the bank's general executive committee. This will give Needles the first banking facilities that community has had since December, 1931, and will be the only bank in the territory extending from San Bernardino to Williams, Arizona. The Bank of America now operates 411 banking offices in 244 California communities.
