

# Gloom Pervades Tartar Camp As First Tilt Looms

## Four Regulars Out As Result of Injuries and Illness

With several of his best players out of the line-up on account of injuries and illness, Coach Bernard J. Donahue of the Torrance Tartars is facing his first Marine League football game with a crippled squad, which makes the chances of a victory over Bell on Friday somewhat remote.

With Herman Hamman, captain and star tackle, in the hospital as a result of injuries received in a practice game Tuesday, and Jimmy McLean, Smith and Atchison out because of illness, the holes in the line-up will have to be filled with substitute material, and all of which fills the Tartar camp with gloom of the deep-dyed variety.

Torrance has been doing exceptionally well in practice games up to now, so that hopes ran high for a victory in their first league game. Now all that can be hoped for, according to the present outlook, is an even break. The game will be played at Bell, starting at 3 o'clock, and the team will be accompanied by a number of Torrance fans.

The Tartars held the Redondo Beach B team to a 12 to 0 score in practice Tuesday afternoon, with Hamman doing considerable damage in breaking up plays prior to the moment when he was injured.

## Total Enrollment Figures at Local Schools Show Gain

Enrollment figures for the end of the second week of school show a total of 276,657 students in the Los Angeles city school district, according to a report released by the board of education on Monday evening, September 26. At junior college, 4505 students were registered, while 95,156 were in attendance at the various junior and senior high schools.

A total of 155,099 pupils were reported as enrolled in the elementary schools, and 16,935 in the evening schools.

The following figures show the enrollment at Torrance high, 658; Torrance elementary, 899; Carson street, 370; Fern avenue, 160; W. Walteria, 152; Narbonne high, 734; Lomita elementary, 460; Orange street school, 380.



**Gauchos Are Set For Opener With Leuzinger Friday**  
Narbonne Varsity Lacking In Weight But Strong On Strategy

Jacob Rilis, defeated the Narbonne varsity, 7-0, in a practice game last Friday afternoon, in a game that might be classed as a victory for the Gauchos, since they held their heavier opponents to one lone touchdown. The Gaucho line-up this year will run fairly light. Weights in the team run from Watanabe's 120 pounds of greased lightning to 170 pounds for the heaviest man on the team.

Watanabe because of his lack of sverdupolis has been playing on the Narbonne B team, and put his team over in good style last Friday when the Gaucho Bees defeated Glendale, 7-0, on the home grounds. He will, however, probably be seen in the varsity line-up because of his superior speed and playing ability.

Coach Ben Comrada's tentative line-up against Leuzinger, which opens the Marine League season tomorrow afternoon on the Gaucho field, will be Carpenter, Holman, or Tawa at the end positions; McEwen, Schmidt, or Gordon, Ahlman, Rider or Shekells, at tackle and guard; Meltz or Nietupski, center; Cheek or Shepard at quarter; Gould or Williams, fullback; and Tidmarsh, Watanabe or Rider, halfbacks. Bobby Brumpton will probably be out at tackle position owing to a bad knee, injured two weeks ago.

Out of this array of talent Comrada hopes to produce a line-up strong enough to take Leuzinger. He may be somewhat short of good substitutes for the varsity owing to the fact that the B team will take most of the material that could have been used. With the B teams playing on the same dates, and under the ruling that no player is eligible under more than one classification, the varsity outlook for subs is rather limited.

However Comrada has pulled himself out of many situations more disquieting than this in other years, and will probably give the Marine League plenty of work during the six scheduled games to head off his rapping Gauchos.

Leuzinger will answer the purpose of a warm-up game for the "big" battle of the season when Gaucho meets Tartar at Torrance on Friday of next week. Both local teams are "pointing" for this game which is the important contest of the year to their loyal fans and fellow students.
