Continued from Page 1 the acquisition of 830 acres of land or 20% of that now subject to flooding and the construction of a regulating reservoir and flood channel.

4. The average annual overdraft on local water supplies has been 6,500 acre feet per year for the past 27 years. The minimum waste to the ocean in the Los Angeles river during the driest year of record has been 12,000 acre feet. The minimum waste to the ocean is, therefore, nearly twice the average overdraft in the area.

5. As an indication of the local benefits and their costs applied to the local areas themselves. Full flood control may be obtained at an average cost of \$43 per acre equivalent to 4% of the present total property value or to \$10 per capita of present population.

Conservation of present waste water sufficient for the domestic requirements of an additional 70,000 persons may be obtained at a cost, including interest, depreciation and all charges at from \$11.00 to \$22.00 per acre foot per year depending upon the amount of filtration and treating of water required.

6. Under the Flood Control District Act, however, costs of construction and operation would be assessed against the entire district on which basis the average first cost would be \$1.14 per acre or \$0.92 per capita present population.

The figures above represent flood control project only. The entire project including treatment would be \$2.70 per acre or \$2.16 per person.
