Gauchos Wreck Banning Pilots For Eighth Time

"Mind the Helm" Boys Fail to Score Against Ancient Rivals

Narbonne triumphed over Banning for the eighth straight year when they defeated the Pilots Friday by an 18-0 score on Banning's field.

Narbonne kicked to Banning starting the game, but the Pilots got nowhere, so they punted to Narbonne. Narbonne started gaining ten and 15 yards at a crack, but lost the ball on a fumble. Till the end of the first quarter the ball passed from one team to the other. In the second period, Narbonne started a drive that ended with Gould taking the ball over for the first score, but the try for the extra point failed. The half ended with Banning in possession of the ball.

Banning again received but held the ball for only four plays. Watanabe ran 30 yards on a triple criss-cross, but failed to get the ball over. In the final quarter, Narbonne pushed the ball down to the Pilots three-yard strip and lost the ball on downs. Billy Kott dropped back to punt, but his attempt was blocked giving Lomita the ball on Banning's two-yard line. A line buck put the ball over giving the Gauchos their second score. Again the attempt of conversion failed.

Towards the end of the game Narbonne made a steady march straight to Banning's goal making Lomita's third touchdown and at this point the game ended 18-0.

High School Beaten After Seven Years

ASHLAND, Ky.—(U.P.)—It took almost seven years for Ashland high school's football team to meet defeat—but it finally came.

It came when Ashland lost a 19 to 13 decision to East High, of Erie, Pa., on October 15. Erie's winning touchdown was made in the last 10 seconds.

The last time Ashland had been beaten was on November 11, 1925, when Huntington, W. Va., won a 13 to 6 victory. That was Ashland's only defeat in 10 games played during the 1925 season.

Between its two defeats, Ashland high won 60 games and was tied four times.

Terms of Proposed Stadium Contract Given By U. S. C.

In a letter forwarded yesterday to Los Angeles county supervisors and city council, the University of Southern California requested the preparation of a contract for use of Olympic Memorial Stadium for Trojan football games.

That the taxpayers of Los Angeles city and county, owners of the stadium, may be advised of the correct interpretation of such a contract, the letter requested that it should cover the following points:

"A. Nine days, including Saturdays and holidays, of each and every year during the period between the second week of September and the second week of December, inclusive, for the next ten years. This is exclusive of Armistice Day and all other nights, holidays and six Saturdays at which time the Olympic Stadium will be available for other sports or civic attractions, between the second week in September and the second week of December.

"B. That on or before December 31st of each and every year the University of Southern California will file a written statement with the city council and county supervisors setting forth the nine specific dates in the succeeding year that it will use the stadium for the purposes mentioned, and that any and all dates not specifically mentioned in said written statement shall be deemed released and excluded from the terms thereof for each year.

"C. The University of Southern California agrees to pay over to the city and county, as rental of the stadium, 20 per cent of the first \$10,000.00, and 10 per cent of all admission receipts in excess of that amount."

Work On Trails to Provide Employment For Next Six Months

Work for approximately 300 men for a period of six months was provided this week by the board of supervisors, in authorizing the flood control district engineer to proceed with construction of 90 miles of trails through the San Gabriel and tributary canyons.

Work is to be started at once upon the trails, with \$25,000 set aside for that purpose out of \$260,000 allocated by the supervisors this week. As soon as the trails are completed workmen then may reach the vicinity of the check dams and construction of these will proceed, providing additional labor at that time.
