And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good.' A correlative passage from the Christian Science textbook, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' by Mary Baker Eddy, says, 'Because Mind makes all, there is nothing left to be made by a lower power.'"

Church to Hold Election Service On Sunday Night

Next Sunday night, November 6, the Torrance Christian church, located on Engracia at Arlington avenue, will hold an election service. According to the pastor, Rev. George Elder, the Sunday night before the election provides a wonderful opportunity for the discussion of personal responsibilities in political affairs.

The auditorium for this special service will be decorated in national colors, the American flag predominating. The service will open with a prelude of patriotic airs played by Mr. Thomas Ulrich. Special song sheets carrying patriotic numbers will be used. The "big sing" will be led by an outside song leader. A male quartet and the chorus choir will render patriotic selections. An additional feature in the form of an election booth, borrowed from the county officials, and set up on the platform, will be provided. The audience will see two electors enter the booth. The pastor will take as his subject, "Party Politics."

The climax for the service will be the playing of "The Star Spangled Banner." The pastor said: "We cordially invite the people of Torrance and vicinity to attend this unique service."
