## Tons of Food to Be Shipped Into Los Angeles Co.

### H. W. Beach Goes North Monday to Supervise Project

H. W. Beach, manager for the Co-operative Relief Association in Torrance, will start for the San Joaquin valley on Monday to be absent about two weeks to supervise the shipment of from 500 to 700 tons of foodstuffs from the northern part of the state to Los Angeles county.

Mr. Beach has been chosen by Col. Wyman, county food commissioner to be the official representative in charge of this work. Torrance men will supervise all activities of gathering and shipping the food, which will include potatoes, sweet potatoes, grapes, raisins, and other commodities grown in the north.

This collection will be distributed in Los Angeles county to the needy week with 2000 cans of tomatoes, some of which, because of their late start in the co-operative relief work, have had a hard struggle to get along.

Mr. Beach and E. M. Kingsley returned the latter part of last week with a supply of commodities and arranged for the shipment by steamer of 175 sacks of potatoes which are now in the warehouse.

The canning crew furnished the Salvation Army at Wilmington last week with 2000 cans of tomatoes and are working this week on a consignment of 1000 cans for the Monterey Park Relief Association. The work is done here because the men are experienced and it is thought inadvisable to lend the equipment. The expenses for gas, water, etc., are borne by the unit for which the work is done.

The Co-operative Relief Association realized the sum of \$27.25 in cash from the proceeds of the Elroy Revue last Friday night, and a smaller sum in groceries.
