Fifty New Members of State Legislature

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—Fifty new faces will be seen in the California state legislature which convenes here next January.

This represents the greatest turnover in membership for more than a decade. Of the new members, 41 are in the assembly and nine in the senate.

Perhaps the biggest upset occurred in Southern California, where 10 incumbent Republican assemblymen were swept out of office by Democratic opponents. The assembly now has 65 Republican members and 25 Democrats, a gain of 18 Democrats, while the senate has 35 Republicans and five Democrats, only two new Democrats being chosen on November 8.
