## —at Narbonne High School

"El Eco," Narbonne high school annual, issue of 1932, was awarded first place in the contest among schools in Class A at the press convention of Los Angeles city high schools held at Los Angeles high school on Saturday, November 19. This is the first time that Narbonne has won the honor in this competition, and the editors of "El Eco" for 1932 are being congratulated by their school mates and the faculty for their excellent showing.

The winning publication was edited by Viola Sauer. Awards in the contests in which school papers were entered, gave the Narbonne Green and Gold second place in the feature story contest, and a tie for third in the editorial contest.

The press conference was attended by Weldon Jeter, editor of the Green and Gold, Harry Likens, assistant editor, Helen Hobbs, circulation manager; Miss McGarry, journalism teacher; Calista Washburn, 1933 editor of "El Eco." The highlight of the convention was a speech by Harry Carr, feature writer of the Los Angeles Times.

Finishing touches are being given to the junior class play, "Stray Cats," which will be presented in the auditorium on December 2.

Mothers of the ninth grade pupils will be the special guests on this occasion. There will be no December meeting on account of the holiday vacations.
