The words of the Psalmist, "As the mountains are round about Jerusalem, so the Lord is round about his people from henceforth even for ever," are the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "God the Preserver of Man," on Sunday, December 11, in all branches of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.
One of the Bible citations in the Lesson-Sermon includes the verses from the Acts: "And when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks, and laid them on the fire, there came a viper out of the heat, and fastened on his hand. . . . And it came to pass, that the father of Publius lay sick of a fever and of a bloody flux; to whom Paul entered in, and prayed, and laid his hands on him, and healed him. So when this was done, others also, which had diseases in the island, came, and were healed."
Among the correlative passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, is the statement: "The divine Love, which made harmless the poisonous viper, which delivered men from the boiling oil, from the fiery furnace, from the jaws of the lion, can heal the sick in every age and triumph over sin and death."

Proposed Change In State Laws to Aid All Counties

Seven Propositions to Be Taken Up At Meeting Friday

Proposed legislation beneficial to Los Angeles and other counties in the state to be sought at the next session of the state legislature will be formally taken up at a meeting on Friday in the hall of records of representatives from every section in the state.

Los Angeles county has taken the lead in the proposed legislation and has asked Deputy County Counsel Harold Kennedy to prepare drafts of bills now planned for submission to the legislature, amongst them:

1. Financial aid of county-wide projects from the gasoline and motor vehicle tax revenues so as to lighten the load generally placed on taxpayers in assessment districts.
2. Building by the state of exp-position buildings on county property.
3. Placing of court reporters on a monthly salary rather than on a fee basis, which will result in a saving to the county of approximately \$150,000 a year.
4. Giving the county fosterer the right to charge for automobile parking in county recreational areas, thereby contributing by such monies to the support of the areas.
5. Transferring of the maintenance expense for tubercular institutions from the county to the state.
6. Sharing by the county in fines collected for the violation of the state fish and game laws.
7. Requiring by the board of property for taxes be made to the county instead of the state.

Cemetery Hearing Postponed One Week

Hearing on the proposal to establish a cemetery at the south-west corner of Olive street and Murphy road, between Gardena and Compton, was continued until next Monday by the board of supervisors this week. Continuance was ordered because Supervisor John R. Quinn was absent from the regular board meeting and property owners desired that he be present at the hearing.

More than a score of residents, many of them from Compton, were present to enter protests. Application to put in the cemetery has been made by Walter L. Knox of Watts. The area is unrestricted, and in unincorporated territory, but requires a permit from the supervisors.

Low Mailing Rate On Christmas Cards

Christmas cards may be mailed this year for 1 1/2 cents, providing they are unsealed and contain no handwriting other than the name of the sender, according to information received by Postmaster Alfred Gourlier.

The cards may contain engraved or printed verses, but absolutely not to contain anything other than the name of the sender. To those who mail a large number of cards this is considered a worthwhile saving.
