

Torrance Residents Are Injured In Bad Traffic Accident

Miss Joy Mildred Heglie, age 16, daughter of Mrs. Charles Dunham, 1403 Carson street, is at the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital being treated for injuries received in an automobile accident on December 28. Miss Heglie is suffering from a fracture of the pelvic bones, besides other injuries.

The accident occurred at Harbor boulevard and Carson street when cars driven by Benjamin F. Riley, 1413 220th street, and George F. Punte, a sailor of the U. S. S. Milwaukee, collided. With Riley were Miss Heglie, his wife and daughter, Beatrice, aged 17, who also sustained a fractured pelvis, but who was able to be removed to her home Wednesday. Mr. and Mrs. Riley also were injured but not seriously. Punte was not hurt.

County Plans to Have Needy Call At Depots For Food Instead of Making Deliveries at Homes

Changes in the method of distributing food to county welfare cases in Torrance, Lomita and other parts of the county which it is believed will effect a saving of nearly \$200,000 annually to the taxpayers are contemplated by the board of supervisors. It was announced this week by Chairman Frank L. Shaw. The new plan is expected to be put into operation in Long Beach next week and if satisfactory will be expanded to other parts of the county.

Briefly, the new plan is to have the needy come to food depots and obtain their food, instead of having it delivered to their doors as at present. It is the same plan for the distribution of milk that will be tried out in Pasadena beginning January, as announced last week by Supervisor Roger W. Jessup.

"At present," Shaw explained, "groceries are supplied county wide from the Compton avenue warehouse at which standard grocery orders are assembled and delivered. The orders are either called for by the indigents or delivered to them. Another channel of distribution in effect now is through privately-owned grocery stores in all parts of the county. The cost of distribution through the warehouse is very low; through the grocery stores it is very high.

"Local grocers who supply standard grocery orders to indigents receive from the county a price determined by adding 25 per cent to the county's actual cost for the same order assembled and ready for distribution. In other words, 20 per cent of the amount paid to the grocers is the cost to the county for the distribution of standard orders through grocers.

"Grocers furnish approximately \$1,216,000 worth of groceries annually in the county. Distribution by this method costs the county about \$243,000 annually, and by the new system we can save about \$200,000," Shaw said.

Adult Classes At U.S.C. Open Again, Jan. 3-6

Lectures in All Classes During First-Week Free and Open to Public

With the opening of the winter quarter at University College, adult education division University of Southern California set for the week of January 3 to 6, it is expected that many Torrance teachers, as well as business and professional students, will return to their class work in the Transportation building at Seventh and Los Angeles streets, Los Angeles. Registrations during the fall quarter closing December 10 showed a total of five students from this city enrolled in one or more commercial, technical, cultural or teacher-training courses.

In most Southern California cities, the largest body of students attending the Los Angeles night classes were teachers, many of whom were engaged in earning university credits for either their masters' degrees or their secondary teaching equipment. Figures for the fall quarter showed that 20 per cent of the student body of nearly 2800 at University College was composed of Los Angeles city and county school teachers. Hundreds of other teachers from outside the county brought the total enrollment of teachers to approximately 40 per cent of the entire student body.

With the growth of interest in adult education, Dean Ernest W. Ties has announced that lectures in all classes during the first week of the new quarter will be free and open to the public. The majority of these will take place at 7 p. m., although a number are scheduled for as early as 4 and 5:30 p. m. Except for a few classes held on the U. S. C. campus at University Park, the public lectures will take place in the Transportation building headquarters of the college.

Besides nearly 40 courses for teachers, University College will offer more than 200 business, professional and technical subjects with university credit. In the commercial field courses are offered in accounting, banking and finance, economics, insurance, merchandising, advertising, salesmanship, retail store management, real estate, secretarial administration and trade and transportation. All departments having courses on the university campus are sponsoring groups of related courses at University College with the same instructors in charge of the work.
