

### Engineer Satisfied With Awards In Outfall Sewer Right of Way

Complete satisfaction in the damage award made for the right-of-way to be obtained for constructing the White's Point outfall sewer, which will serve Torrance, Lomita, Palos Verdes Hills, Harbor City, Gardena, Compton, Lynwood, South Gate, Cudahy, Bell, Maywood, Huntington Park, Montebello and the Belvedere section, was expressed today by A. K. Warren, chief engineer of the county sanitation districts.

The awards, totaling but \$14,203, were made to the Sepulveda Land Company, Roman Sepulveda, owner of the company; Louis Sepulveda, manager, and to the Averill estate.

The Sepulvedas, owners of the Palos Verdes hills through which the 20-foot right-of-way is to be acquired, are to receive \$13,401 of the amount—\$600 damages for one parcel, \$7500 for another upon which stands a small restaurant, pier, garden and trees, with \$3500 for damages to the remainder of the parcel, and \$1900 for a temporary easement in constructing a roadway across a third parcel, to be used during construction of the outfall project.

In contrast to the awards, fixed by a jury in Superior Judge Doug-


las L. Edmonds' court, was the testimony of appraisers engaged by the defendant, one of whom estimated the damages as high as \$650,000. Another estimated the damages at \$450,000, but Judge Edmonds ordered their testimony stricken from the records after Attorney Vincent Morgan, special counsel for the sanitation districts, had elicited testimony from the defendant's appraisers during cross-examination which caused the court to believe they were using the wrong yardstick.

Mr. and Mrs. George S. Averill and Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Weymouth were allowed one dollar each for the right-of-way to be condemned through their property, and \$400 severance damages. The Sepulvedas were allowed one dollar for right-of-way through parcel No. 1.

With the condemnation suit decided, A. K. Warren, chief engineer, announced today that a settlement already has been reached with the Palos Verdes Estates for the right-of-way necessary through that area.

The outfall is to be constructed from Harbor City for a distance of nearly eight miles to a point 5000 feet off White's Point.
