## County Assessor Asks Suspension of Five Day Week

Suspension of the five-day week for the county assessor's department beginning March 1, as requested by County Assessor Ed Hopkins, was being considered today by the board of supervisors.

On that date, Hopkins stated, his department must begin the assessing of all property in the county, and according to law the work must be completed by July 1. More than 1100 temporary clerks and deputies are employed by his office during March, April, May and June, and it is necessary to operate on a five and one-half day week in order to finish the work on time, Hopkins stated.

"To continue on a five-day week would necessitate an additional \$45,000 for our salary budget," Hopkins told the board, "and we do not desire to ask for an additional appropriation."
