### Torrance Men Find Dead Body of Man Near Redondo Pier

Fred Curler, 2011 Gramercy avenue, and Tommy King, 1324 Sartori avenue, who had gone to Redondo Beach early last Thursday morning, discovered the body of a man in the water near the north approach to the Redondo horseshoe pier. The discovery was made about 8:25 and was reported to the Redondo police, who removed the corpse to Niland's mortuary.

Laundry marks on his clothing were the only means of identification, which are being checked by the police. A crumpled and water-soaked piece of paper in his pocket was thought to be his farewell note, but due to the action of water and sand all writing except a few disconnected words was illegible. He was apparently about 50 years old, well dressed, had one glass eye.

were committed to the county jail. Charges of contributing to the delinquency of minors have been lodged against the other five young men.

The girls involved in the affair are said to be from 12 to 14 years of age. They have been placed in the custody of the juvenile hall. According to the officers in charge of the investigation liquor was brought in considerable quantities and the girls and their young friends are said to have spent a number of nights at the Vaughn cottage.

Vaughn is said to have been living at the 236th street address for the past seven months, but the "parties" which have culminated in the arrest of all concerned have been going on only since last Thanksgiving day.

Discovery of the "love nest" came about through the suspicions of a mother of one of the girls involved who appealed to a San Pedro policeman for assistance in getting information from the child. The woman officer succeeded in getting the names of the other girls and sufficient information which led her to report the matter to the sheriff's office. Immediate investigation brought the arrest of all the parties so far named with the exception of two, who it is expected will be apprehended within a short time.
