Work Projects To Be Financed Out of R. F. C. Funds

County Road and Other Departments Prepare Full List

Work projects totaling more than \$175,000 will be made available in this supervisory district before the end of the month, it became known today at the board of supervisors.

At the request of Supervisor John R. Quinn, the county road department today was preparing a full list of projects which could be started and carried to completion with hand labor. Some will be found in every vicinity, it was indicated.

Funds for the work projects are part of the \$1,770,000 obtained from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, \$900,000 of which will be available between now and March 1, and the balance during March. It was announced at the Hall of Records today that \$250,000 would be available at once. The \$900,000 is to be divided evenly among the five supervisory districts, for direct relief and work relief.

Los Angeles county, according to Chairman Frank L. Shaw, will endeavor to find constructive projects for its unemployed on the county charity rolls who are able to work.

All employment will be handled through the county employment stabilization bureau, which now is located at 331 New High street. Administration of the R. F. C. funds will be through a special commissioner, George Cuthbert, appointed at a special meeting of the board of supervisors late Friday afternoon. Cuthbert, a Los Angeles resident, whom Mayor John C. Porter recently appointed as manager of the city's harbor department, subject to approval of the city council, formerly was president of the association for the blind. His appointment was requested by Rheta Crawford Spillano, state director of public welfare. He will scrutinize all proposed work projects, check over the county's relief program and make all disbursements of R. F. C. funds.
