The board of directors of the local Christian Science church has been invited to view a public exhibit of international news and advertising of The Christian Science Monitor, that is being held in Los Angeles.

This exhibit, feature and news items of the Monitor are presented attractively by unique posters and scrapbooks. The contents of the paper are graphically shown in special groupings; and the various pages devoted to educational activities, the Home Forum, women's interests, finance, book reviews, etc., have their sections. A mezzanine floor is given to the children's and young folks' items. Hand painted posters give publicity to advertisers in the Monitor.

The international aspect of the paper permeates the exhibition. The room in which the display is held, on the ground floor of the Roosevelt Building, 713 West 7th street, Los Angeles, has been especially decorated and artistically furnished. On Wednesdays it closes at 7 p. m., and on Sundays and holidays it is open from 1 to 6 p. m.

Harbor City and Lomita Routes to Be Discontinued

The railroad commission has authorized the Motor Coach Company of Long Beach, to discontinue service over the following routes:

From the intersection of Anaheim and Wilmington boulevards north on Wilmington boulevard to Lomita boulevard (formerly West street), thence via Lomita boulevard to Narbonne avenue in Lomita, a distance of four miles;

From the intersection of Lomita and Redondo-Wilmington boulevards (also known as Redondo-Wilmington road), thence via Redondo-Wilmington boulevard to Walnut street, thence via Walnut street to Redondo-Wilmington boulevard, thence via Redondo-Wilmington boulevard to its intersection with 25th street (a continuation of Anaheim boulevard) at Reed street in Lomita;

From the intersection of Redondo-Wilmington boulevard and Narbonne avenue in Lomita, thence via Redondo-Wilmington boulevard, Redondo-Wilmington road, Redondo boulevard, Hawthorne boulevard, and Walnut boulevard in Waverly to Avenue I in Redondo Beach, thence via Avenue I to Esplanade, thence via Esplanade to Catalina street, thence via Catalina street to its intersection with Pacific avenue and Torrance boulevard (formerly known as Opal street), a distance of four and nine-tenths miles;

From the intersection of Water street and Pier street (also known as Pier A street), thence via Pier street to the Los Angeles Steamship Company's docks a distance of approximately 1.7 miles.

Women As Teachers Explained By Board

Hundreds of protests received by the Los Angeles city board of education against the employment of married women as teachers in Torrance and other cities served by the Los Angeles city school district drew an explanation this week from Superintendent Frank Bouelle.

"The state teachers' tenure law allows dismissal of teachers for but four or five reasons, and marriage is not one of them," Superintendent Bouelle explained. "It would be the dearest thing for many of these married teachers to step out of course, but there is no way we can compel them to do so."
