

Los Angeles County Awarded Nearly 4 Million R. F. C. Funds

Machinery for the employment of between 50,000 and 75,000 jobless men in March and April was set in motion this week by Frank L. Shaw, chairman of the county board of supervisors, when Shaw appealed to officials of 45 municipalities in the county to expedite public improvements on which Reconstruction Finance Corporation funds may be expended. Shaw's appeal followed receipt of official confirmation that the R. F. C. has awarded Los Angeles county \$3,715,562 for unemployment relief for the next 60 days. The money will be available within a few days, Shaw declared. At the same time, Shaw announced that the Los Angeles city park board has secured approval for improvement projects which will give employment to approximately 5000 men under the new loan. Other Los Angeles city departments also are preparing to launch building and improvement programs immediately. It was stated. "It will be the aim of the board of supervisors and the bureau of employment stabilization, to distribute the R. F. C. funds to the 45 municipalities and to the unincorporated county areas in proportion to the registration of unemployed persons in each community," Shaw's appeal to the mayors and legislative bodies declared. "We must be governed in approval of applications on the merits of proposed improvement projects and the date of their receipt," the appeal continued. "For this reason, it is urged that you take immediate steps to expedite public improvements and to make available tools and materials for the work."

The appeal pointed out that R. F. C. funds may be spent only on worthwhile, permanent improvements, and for wages only. Employment for approximately 10,000 men from the new R. F. C. funds will be provided, Shaw asserted, on projects which were launched under the \$1,700,000 loan received last month and which have not been completed. These projects are scattered throughout the county. Work for approximately 25,000 men was provided from the February loan, and approximately three-fifths of the projects launched in February have been completed, Shaw declared. New work approved for the Los Angeles city park board, the first large and important project provided by the city, will result in immediate improvement of two parks, Shaw announced. The work was approved, it was stated, at a meeting called at Shaw's request and attended by park commissioners, representatives of the board of supervisors and George F. Cuthbert, co-ordinator for Los Angeles county for the R. F. C. In Griffith Park, 3500 men will be given work. The program here provides for widening from 18 to 30 feet for seven miles through the park of the north extension of Western avenue; for permanent improvement of Dark Canyon road for a distance of four miles through the park, and for the planting of 6000 trees. In Arroyo Seco park, 1500 men will be employed in removing stumps, erection of barbecue ovens and picnic facilities, highway improvement, surveys for a new highway around the east side of the park, and the planting of 2000 trees. "We are especially gratified that the Los Angeles Park Board has co-operated with us under the new loan," Shaw declared. "During February, Los Angeles city failed to provide jobs or materials in proportion to the city's unemployed registration, while we were given the fullest co-operation by all other municipalities of the county. We hope that other Los Angeles city departments will follow the park board's lead and get under way immediately projects that will absorb the city's portion of unemployment relief."

Narbonne is sending four student delegates and one faculty adviser to attend the eleventh annual newspaper day to be held at U. S. C. Saturday, March 18. Those who will attend are Betty Myersbough, editor of the Green and Gold; Helen Hobbs, assistant editor; Calista Washburn, editor of El Eco, and Miss McGarry, journalism teacher. The program for high school and junior college journalism students will open at 9 a. m. in Bovard auditorium. There will be speeches by men and women prominent in the newspaper field and after luncheon, round table discussions. Helen Johnson, an A-11, has proved herself an accurate and efficient typist. Miss Shea received word from A. N. Bullock, supervisor of commercial education in the Los Angeles city schools, that Helen has been awarded the second highest typing award for last semester in the city of Los Angeles. She typed at the rate of 29 words per minute, for ten minutes, with only three errors. Helen was also required to do the following correctly: make a neat carbon copy, address an envelope neatly and correctly, fold a letter properly, arrange business letters artistically, use tabular stops, change a typewriter ribbon, make a stencil, and make a mimeograph copy from the stencil. The student who received the highest award was Jessie Willden of Garfield, who typed 73 words with two errors for a period of ten minutes. Five boys were recently elected to membership in the Vigilantes boys' honor club at Narbonne. Robert Melz, Hall McEwen, Glenn Shekell, Franklin Smalley and Carl Starkey, all of whom have been outstanding in leadership and in service to the school, were the boys who received this honor. Membership in the club, which is sponsored by Mr. Comrada, is limited to 12. Three senior A girls and one senior B have been chosen as members of the Jane Addams Club, an honor organization for senior high girls. New members are Virginia Schock, Phyllis Watson and Hilda Robertshaw, A-12's; and Harriett Fink, B-12. Old members include Helen Hobbs, president; Geneva Backus, Mary Likens, Betty Myerscough, Velaine Flint, Marie Parsons, and Madeline M. Mackay.

The seniors put on a peppy assembly chiefly for the benefit of the juniors, Friday, March 3, during roll call period. After the juniors had taken their seats, the senior A's came marching down the aisle with a sign stating their supremacy. The senior "Depression Band," under the direction of Claude Omohundro, played some of the popular tunes of today which were appreciated by all except the eleventh graders. Other numbers on the pep program were a mock wedding in which Alva Hawkins and Hilda Robertshaw acted the roles of bride and groom, and a ghost act in which three weird figures paraded across the stage, with one of them disclosing that object of awe—the senior key—beneath his gown. The curtain was drawn just as four wild Indians, after giving a savage war dance, pounced on their victim, a football dummy dressed to represent a junior. The climax of the program came during the noon hour when the seniors defeated their rivals, the juniors, in a water fight.

The Narbonne G. A. A. and Lettermen are planning a formal Cotton and Cord dance to be held Friday evening, March 17, in the gymnasium. A Saint Patrick's Day motif will be used in the decoration scheme. This dance takes the place of the formal banquet that used to be enjoyed by the two athletic associations. Miss Mason and Mr. Comrada, sponsors, are working with their committees to make the affair a success. Narbonne placed fifth in division 4 at the L. A. relay carnival held Saturday, March 4. The Gauchos, however, though they didn't make it, enjoyed a general showing as in other years, with distinction by setting a new record of 2 minutes 35.3 seconds in the mixed medley relay. It was run by the following boys: Tado, C. 55; Frank Watanabe, C. 110; Hede Watanabe, B. 220; Bylin, B. 660. The C medley relay placed second. It was composed of Frank Watanabe, Amos Nance, Hiram Powers, and Narbonne's medley relay of Class B came in fourth, while the class A four-man 440 was only able to place fifth. Outstanding record performances were made in the class B high jump and class C broad jump. Chisim, colored Poly high jumper, cleared 6 feet 4 inch to win the lightweight leap. Marumoto, sturdy-legged Gardena Boy, bounced off the broad jump take-off board 21 feet 2 1/2 inches to better the old mark by 2 feet 5 inches.

Party Will Follow Route to Intake Site Near Parker

Metropolitan water district directors were somewhere along the line of the Colorado river aqueduct today, having left Los Angeles Friday for their first inspection tour since active construction work was launched. Scheduled to return to Los Angeles Sunday evening, members of the party will follow the route of the aqueduct to the intake site on the Colorado river near Parker, Arizona. En route, inspection is to be made of the district's new field headquarters building at Banning.
