
## Carson St. Vets Complain About Halting Dances

Grant contended that fights were also common at dances held by the Torrance Veterans' Relief and that its dances were not stopped. He complained of discriminations against the Carson street association. The matter was referred to Police Commissioner Earl Connor and Chief of Police Calder.

## County Food Depot May Be Set Up Here

County Purchasing Department Has Plan Under Consideration

Advisability of establishing a county food depot at Torrance was under consideration this week by the county purchasing department.

Following a survey which has revealed the success of the plan in more than a score of communities throughout the county.

The food depot plan was put into operation last February in Alhambra, and found to be practical. Under the plan, persons receiving grocery orders from the county welfare department are notified to call at the central food depot for their orders, instead of having them delivered to them.

This saving in delivery costs is a large item, the board of supervisors was informed after a survey had been made by the bureau of efficiency.

Today there are 22 of these county-operated food depots throughout the county, according to H. E. Russell, county purchasing agent.

Savings of \$315,000 annually are being effected, due to the fact that the county buys its groceries and foodstuffs at wholesale. The move means, however, that considerable business is taken away from neighborhood grocery stores.

Supplies also are under way this week to install food depots in Hollywood and Redondo. The last three food depots were put in at Lennox, Palms and West Los Angeles, according to Russell, whose duty it is to purchase the several millions dollars worth of necessary groceries annually.

Food centers have been opened at the following cities and community centers, in addition to those mentioned: Compton, Wilmington, Long Beach, North Long Beach, San Pedro, Pasadena, Monrovia, Baldwin Park, Ocean Park, Venice, Eagle Rock, Van Nuys, North Hollywood, San Fernando and other places.

**City to Get Percentage**

Revenue for the upkeep of the park will be derived from a percentage of the gate receipts from all ball games which are played for profit on the grounds. The council authorized the drawing up of simple contracts with the managers of the ball teams who are to use the grounds, by which 10 per cent of the intake must be paid to the city.

For the present the principal source of revenue, it is expected, will be from the night league games on Friday, when the Torrance Bluebirds meet other teams in the league here.

Murphy has scheduled 18 games for the home park, playing here every Friday night. Cost of the lighting for the night games make it desirable and necessary that the city should share in the revenue of these games, and this stipulation will be included in all contracts.

## Homemakers' Bureau

**HAPPY ENDINGS**  
Dessert is the happy ending of any meal as it is the sweet finishing touch we all enjoy and anticipate.

Canned fruits, dried fruits, and fresh fruits are ever ready helpers in making these delicacies. They combine well with flavored gellatins and custard as foundation.

Halves of canned peaches, or pears with a marshmallow placed in the center and broiled until brown are dainty enough to serve the most fastidious of friends.

It is satisfying to have one standard dessert as a cottage pudding and vary it by serving with different sauces, as lemon, orange, fresh crushed strawberries or raspberries, when in season. A very simple, tasty sauce may be made by adding crushed fruit to stiffly beaten egg whites to which sugar has been beaten in as sugar meringue. It is ever so light, fluffy and good to eat. Again cut fruits, or nuts may be added to the batter before baking, or the bottom of the tin prepared as for

an upside down cake, with melted butter, brown sugar, and either left "as is," or fruits arranged over the bottom. There are many possibilities in variations. Puddings of this type are best served hot with either hot or cold sauce, depending upon what else is included in the meal.

Rice is another reliable ingredient for desserts. It may be included in a baked custard, served plain with a custard sauce, or made into a nest; a canner peach placed in the hollow and all spread with whipped cream. It then becomes a peach Melba.

Pieces of cake cut into desired shapes and spread with a bit of marmalade and covered with meringue and baked just before serving are delicious for a luncheon dessert. Women like these better than men; serve pie frequently to please the men.

With fresh rhubarb in the market try this sauce.

**Rhubarb De Luxe**

4 cups rhubarb  
2 cups sugar  
1 orange  
12 whole cloves  
1/2 teaspoon mace  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Cut the rhubarb in pieces before measuring. Grate orange and extract juice. Combine all ingredients and place in a casserole; cover and bake until rhubarb is tender, or about 40 minutes in a moderate oven (350° F.). If very juicy, uncover during the last 15 minutes of baking.
