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a reservoir site was pointed out by City Engineer Leonard, but again Mayor Klusman interrupted with the statement, "Don't you think it premature?"

Leonard stated he considered the purchase of a reservoir site an important matter. He recommended a 6.06-acre site north of Torrance boulevard and west of Cedar because it is the only high land available. The property is owned by the Chanslor Canfield Midway Company, and has an elevation of 113 feet. The city engineer pointed out the economy of securing a high location for the reservoir in order to save pumping charges. In the original estimate for constructing the municipal water system, Leonard said he figured the C. C. M. O. site could be purchased for \$2200 an acre, but that in a recent conversation with company officials in Los Angeles a price of \$3000 an acre was suggested.

Both City Engineer Leonard and Councilman Conner pointed out that the C. C. M. O. is not anxious to sell the property, but Leonard said that Mr. Clotfelter of the oil company had agreed recently to open negotiations for the purchase of the 6.06-acre reservoir site if the city so desired.

Leonard stressed the need for prompt action in connection with the purchase of a reservoir site, as any agreement would have to be signed by officials of the oil company in the east. "Isn't it queer?" When Mayor Klusman protested against the price asked by the oil company and branded the discussion of a reservoir site purchase as "premature," Councilman Ludlow answered, "Don't you think it queer, Mr. Mayor, that the city is begging the water company to sell its system? Why not go ahead with our plans and make them feel we are independent?" Ludlow pointed out that before the bonds should be sold, the city would want to know it had a place to build its plant. After further argument a motion authorizing negotiations with the C. C. M. O. for an option on the proposed reservoir site was adopted by the council.

Applications For Loans to Repair Quake Damage Received

Details of the procedure to be followed by persons seeking financial assistance for the reconstruction of homes or buildings damaged by the recent earthquake, were made known today in a statement issued by the Unified Rehabilitation Corporation, the agency appointed by the R. F. C. to take charge of the disbursement of the \$5,000,000 loan appropriation made by Congress.

The organization of the Unified Rehabilitation Corporation has now been completed to the point where applications for loans for the reconstruction of earthquake damage are being acted upon. Formal application blanks for loans have been distributed to numerous places in the affected area. If you desire to apply for a loan to reconstruct damaged property and have not already received the application blanks, inquire at your Chamber of Commerce or bank or of someone in your community who has been active on your community earthquake committee.

Observers Pick Shaw As Winner In Mayor Race

With the Los Angeles city primary election only a few days away and with interest in the election at top notch, Supervisor Frank L. Shaw today appeared certain to lead the ticket in the race for mayor, with a fair chance of victory without a run-off. This was the opinion of political strategists from all sections of the city. An unprecedented swing of voters to Shaw, his general popularity with the voters, and recognition of his ability and leadership were given as the reason for the optimistic forecasts. "Realization that the only way Porter can be defeated is to vote for Shaw, has led many thousands to turn their support to Shaw




FRANK L. SHAW, Chairman of County Board of Supervisors, and Favorite Candidate for Mayor of Los Angeles at Election May 2.

with the past week," declared Rex B. Goodell, prominent attorney and head of the Good Government League. "There is only one man who can beat Porter, and that is Shaw," Goodell added. Dr. D. A. Russell, prominent pastor and former Porter campaign manager, expressed a similar view. "We must have a new deal in Los Angeles just as we have one in the nation," he declared, "and Shaw is the best qualified candidate to give it to us. Shaw is a positive, constructive public official. In my opinion he is the candidate who can defeat Porter. There is every evidence that the voters see the situation in the same light." "Because a vote for Shaw is a vote for progressive principles," said Mrs. Francis J. Heney, wife of the famous jurist and prosecutor, and president of the National Progressive League, "we are calling on all progressives to support Shaw. Porter's lack of cooperation with the municipal power bureau, his evident lack of leadership and his failure as a leader warrant his retirement by the voters. Shaw is the man to defeat him."

Other political strategists, civic, religious and business leaders, and many organizations and improvement clubs, expressed similar sentiment. It was considered particularly significant that Parent-Teachers Association members throughout the city were swinging into Shaw's following, and that women's organizations were almost solidly in favor of Shaw. Trend of the vote was shown in various non-political, independent polls. One particularly interesting poll was announced by Spring street brokers where there are no takers for three-to-one money that Shaw leads the ticket. This poll showed Shaw 7826 to Porter 4138, with Dempster, Hutson and Cryer trailing with approximately 2000 votes each. The Independent League, an organization of 18 civic and improvement associations, announced a poll showing Shaw had 8721 votes to Porter's 4119, while the City-Wide Business Men's Association poll continued to show Shaw two-to-one ahead of Porter.
