

Torrance Milers Qualify Tuesday For M. L. Finals

Two Distance Men Only Place Winners In Preliminaries

Torrance high placed two men in the Marine League class A preliminaries held at Bell high school Tuesday, qualifying for the finals tomorrow. Preliminaries for the field events were postponed until Friday preceding the main event, so that Torrance still has a chance to qualify one or two more athletes.

Louis Zamperini, undefeated this year in the mile, ran his heat in the first time of 4:47. Marine League record in this event is 4:12.4, held by Gardena, and there is a chance that Louie will crack this mark when he cuts loose in the finals tomorrow.

LaVerne Jones, consistent point-winner in the mile, ran third in the second heat of the mile which was won by McNamara of Leuzinger in 4:57.4.

Zamperini and Jones are expected to enter and place in the Southern California meet which will be held in Los Angeles early in May.

Narbonne high school qualified five men. Sidwell tied for second in the third heat of the 100, which was won in 16.5. Irvine took first in the second heat of the 80, time 2:10. Tidmarsh was third in the second heat of the high hurdles. Watanabe placed second in the third heat of the low hurdles.

Masculine Fans Vote In Favor of Loud Speaker




Fast Train Service On Southern Pacific To Big Ranch Rodeo
