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MRS. LYTLE SPEAKS IN TORRANCE

San Pedro Lomita council, Parent Teachers Association, of which the Torrance chapter is a part, held their monthly meeting in the Torrance Evangelical church last Thursday. Mrs. R. B. Waldo presided at the meeting and introduced Mrs. Letitia Lytle, president of the tenth district Parent Teachers Association and a member of the Los Angeles Board of Education. Briefly Mrs. Lytle outlined the work of parents in the association stating there must be harmony between home and school if the thoughts of children are to be directed in the right channels. She further stated, we must educate our community to meet the demands of our children. Lack of spiritual training and personal dishonesty, she stated, are the cause of the present depression. If we are to avoid these conditions in the future, we must build against them in our children for they are the citizens of tomorrow.

Exonerating the board of education from any blame in connection with schools damaged in the recent earthquake, Mrs. Lytle stated, "Only 65 of the 300 schools in the system were forced to close and 50 per cent of the damaged schools had been annexed to the system." She further stated that no school built since 1927 had been damaged in the quake. The board of education, she said, is composed of fathers and mothers, whose chief concern is the welfare of children. At the present time a group of architects and engineers, led by Dr. Milliken, are doing everything in their power to determine that school buildings in the future shall be as nearly earthquake proof as possible.
