### Notes From Washington

Senator Gore of Oklahoma in a speech in the Senate recited a story which illustrates the importance of the velocity of the circulation of money. One of the evils of frozen assets is that the use of bank checks and other credits are slowed down to a snail's pace. Velocity of circulation of money and credits is an important part of expansion. This is the Senator's story:

"The clown in the circus had 19 other men forming a circle with him in the circus ring. The clown turned to his neighbor on his left and remarked that he owed him \$2 and that he would make payment as soon as he could. The man to the clown's left made the same remark to his neighbor. That assurance went around the ring until the man on the right of the clown gave him a reassuring promise that he owed him \$2 and would make payment as soon as he could. At that point the clown happened to find a silver dollar in his pocket of which he was unaware. He turned to his neighbor on his left and said, 'By the way, I will pay you half that I owe you now.' and handed him the silver dollar. The same message went around the ring until the man on the clown's right made the statement to him and delivered the dollar. The clown thanked him, dropped the money in his pocket, and a moment later putting his hand in his pocket rediscovered the silver dollar. Turning to the man on his left he said, 'By the way, I will pay you off in full. I have a dollar I did not know I had.' The man on his left was as generous or as honest to his neighbor. The silver dollar once again made the circuit and the man on the clown's right delivered to him the silver dollar and paid him off in full; \$1 had paid \$40."

President Roosevelt has raised the hopes of the advocates of silver by the program that is now before Congress. His proposal to permit European nations to pay their debts to the United States to the extent of two hundred million dollars will be watched with much interest. Will the acceptance of this amount of silver increase prices of the silver of the world?

South Trimble, the clerk of the House, and a former member of Congress, is considered an authority on the silver question. Mr. Trimble makes the following deductions from the report of the U. S. mint for 1932. He states that from 1792 to 1848 the value of the silver produced in the U. S. amounted to \$494,500. The gold produced in the United States during the same period of time was valued at \$24,527,000.

The silver produced from 1848 to and including 1872 had a value of \$157,749,000. The gold produced in the United States during the same period amounted to \$1,204,750,000. The silver produced in the U. S. from 1872 to 1932 amounted to \$2,855,641,511. The gold produced during this same period amounted to \$3,398,655,300. Mr. Trimble also shows that the production of silver and gold in the world since the discovery of America shows a ratio of 13 and 98/100 to one. Mr. Trimble also states that not a single gold dollar piece was coined by the U. S. mint until 1819 and also that there has not been a single commercial gold dollar coined since 1839. He also makes a statement that from 1834 to 1873 there never was a minute that silver wasn't a premium over gold.

There never has been a time since the days of William Jennings Bryan that the restoration of silver is receiving as much thought as at the present moment. 
