

Flower Show Opens Friday At Narbonne

Second Annual Exhibit Held In High School Gymnasium

Narbonne's second annual flower show and industrial arts exhibit will be staged Friday afternoon, June 9, at 2:30, in the gymnasium. The affair, which is sponsored by Mr. Fuller, his F. F. A., and the industrial arts teachers, will consist of displays of work done by the metal shop, woodshop, mechanical drafting, art and sewing classes, as well as lovely floral displays.

Blue ribbons will be awarded for first place, red for second, and green for third place in the various divisions. There will also be prizes given by the Lomita merchants. Persons in the community, as well as students, are eligible to enter their exhibits. All are urged to attend the flower show, for which there is no entrance fee.

More Cash For Completion of Scenic Drive

An additional \$15,000 was available today for carrying forward the grading of the roadway for Palos Verdes drive, a scenic drive through the Palos Verdes Hills along the northerly slope of the hills that will overlook Torrance and the area below. Work has been started approximately in the center of the four-mile improvement and crews are working in either direction, making cuts and fills.

The work project is one of the largest R. F. C. projects in the county, several hundred men being employed. Its easterly terminus will be Gaffey street, while on the west connection will be made with existing streets leading into the heart of the Palos Verdes estates development.


He Married The Girl!

The framework, ceiling beams, laths, doors, window frames and all woodwork had to be charred with a blow torch before the carpenters were put to work to hammer the brittle and crumbling material into place. Then came the plastering and wall paper, which were later knocked away in numerous places to reveal the charred laths beneath. The blow torch man was again put to work, burning the paper and crumbling the plaster with heat. Window panes had to be blackened, cracked and broken before being placed in the house. Furniture was then arranged on the set in studied disorder, rugs laid out in studied disarray in their proper places, after which the blow torch man once more applied his heat.



able to supply the demand for their hose, which is manufactured in three sizes, one-half, five-eighths and three-quarter inch, but later the owners expect to add another curing machine which will more than double the output, since it will not be necessary as at present to shut down the "sausage grinder" which produces the hose while the curing process is completed. With two of these machines in operation the curing process can be done in one while the other is being filled.

Not only is the whole operation interesting and novel, but the owners of the plant found the construction of the machinery a solution to a certain amount of unemployment problems among their workmen, who built the machines in the intervals when the plant was not rushed with work in its principal line, the manufacture of pistons.

While the oil industry furnishes the majority of customers for the D & M product, their pistons are being extensively used in the construction work at Boulder Dam, and other large projects of that type.
