Over the seven-sixteenths mile course the hounds will circle the track twice in front of the grandstand.

Included among the leading dogs racing nightly, except Sunday at the strip are such money winners as Traffic Court, Dancing Officer, the sensation of the north this past season; War Cry, John's Honor, and Heavy Traffic and others.



OILERS TAKE THRILLER FROM BLUEBIRDS IN LEAGUE UPSET

Sabella, Pitching Airtight Ball, Shuts Out Torrance Contenders for League Championship, 12-0; Birds Crack Under Strain of Crucial Contest

Some 800 fans from Torrance, Huntington Beach, and other cities in the district, saw the Huntington Beach Oilers swat the Bluebirds into a tailspin Friday night with a score of 12-0, in a game that up to the seventh inning was one of the tightest contests ever pulled off on the local diamond.

With the start of the seventh the Birds cracked under the strain and the balloon went up, taking with it the hopes of the Torrance crowd for a victory that would give the Birds the undisputed right to the championship of the first half of the National Night League series.

The Oilers' victory threw the night loop into a dogfight, for first place that will not be concluded until the final game of the first half series on July 11, with a possibility that Huntington Beach will tie the Murphy's men for the coveted place.

Starting out in the first inning, Osborne, right fielder for the Oilers, struck out. Schwartz fled out on a pop to Neva. Clemons popped out to Neva ending the inning.

Eighty ninth, Clemons fled out to Watson. Maness lined one to P. Neva in center and Rodgers popped to Wolfe.

Storti fled out to Conrad. Alesso got away his third long hit to Schwartz, and Widener singled. Wolfe singled and Watson struck out.

Dopesters At Sea On Outcome of Crew Races

Three Contenders Loom As Possible Winners At Long Beach

LOS ANGELES.—Predictions of the outcome of the National Intercollegiate Crew Race at Long Beach, July 7 and 8, took a new turn last week following Harvard's defeat of Yale at four miles in New London.

On performance so far this season, the Yale eight had been installed as the favorite to fight it out with Washington for the inter-sectional title next month. However, Harvard will enter a stronger sprint crew in the local 2000-meter race than it had for the longer distance in the East.

California is expected to show vast improvement over the crew which was defeated in two races successively by Washington this spring. Coach Carroll (Ky) Ebright has virtually rebuilt his varsity and believes that it will not only prove stronger than the late 1933 boat, but will possess a far better mental attitude.

Cornell, which has not been considered a strong contender for the inter-sectional crown, apparently believes itself capable of finishing well toward the front. The crimson has always been among the nation's leaders in crews.

Couch James Wray expects to have his oarsmen in tip-top condition for the first time this season when they line up for the Long Beach classic. The Lake Cayuga scullers have been battling bad weather and illness all year.

In the temporary absence of the Poughkeepsie Regatta for a year, the local event is the only regatta of the season which brings together the East and the West for national honors. Winners of the race will be recognized as national champions for 1933.

Former Ascot Speed Champ Makes Young Riders Eat Dust

Taking first place honors in four out of five events Sunday afternoon, Lorenzo Doido, 42 years old, made a whirlwind comeback against a field of up-and-coming young riders, such as Trujillo, Mossman, Long and Hartimer.

Doido was at his best on the old style saucer tracks popular in 1912, when he was the champion at the old Ascot Motor Bike Speedway. Sunday marked Doido's third appearance at the Gardens Legion Motor Bowl. On his first two appearances he satisfied himself with trailing along, getting used to the new fifth of a mile track.

Wally Wayfield crashed through a plate glass Sunday as a feature stunt. Wayfield also took Tony Demma in a fast match race, that had the crowd standing and yelling, as it was a matter of inches between them as they jockeyed around the turns for position. Demma claims Wayfield crowded him on the south turn and asked for a rematch next Sunday.

Big Boats Clash In 20-Lap Event Sun.

Eight sprint races ranging from one to five laps, topped off by a 15-lap battle for Class C boats and a 20-lap final event for the big Class F craft, will be held at the Lake Los Angeles Motor Boat Speedway Sunday afternoon.

E. J. Cornett, the racing pilot from Ventura who won the last 20-lap main event, will be out to repeat Sunday. Leo Fukuzawa, the Japanese youngster who ran his boat too close to the shore and bent the fin underneath his craft, has his equipment in shape once more. "Curly" Garner, who broke a connecting rod in his motor before the start of the race, also will be ready for the big event.

California Zoological Gardens Scene of Mammoth Fun-fest

Promising the greatest fun-fest ever staged in Los Angeles county, plans are nearing completion this week for the tenth annual barbecue and picnic of the Sheriff's Relief Association, according to an announcement by Sheriff Eugene W. Biscailuz, president of the organization.

At least 75,000 persons are expected to attend the big event in the California Zoological Gardens, 3800 Mission Road, Los Angeles, on Sunday, July 16, officials of the organization estimated. Last year a gate check showed 40,000 persons attended, but judging from present ticket sales, the attendance is expected to double this year, it was stated.

The annual barbecue and picnic, with its mass of "head liners" entertainment, is held for the purpose of raising funds for the relief of members of the association and their families in case of the death of any officer, or his disability, while in service, Sheriff Biscailuz explained.
