

While the meeting was not open to the public, and no official action was taken, it is understood that a tentative agreement on a budget was reached, which calls for approximately \$25,000 less than was set up for the current year. Other members of the council are reported to have frowned on Mayor Klusman's proposal to further reduce salaries of city employees, in the face of policy of private business to increase wages.
