CHURCHES OF CHRIST, SCIENTIST


"Truth" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all Christian Science churches, branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. The Golden Text is from Psalm 109: "The Lord is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations."
The Responsive Reading includes Isaiah's words: "O Lord, thou art my God; I will exalt thee. I will praise thy name; for thou hast done wonderful things; thy counsels of old are faithfulness and truth." One of the Scriptural citations in the Lesson-Sermon presents these verses from the psalm: "I will praise thee, O Lord, among the people; and I will sing praise unto thee among the nations. For thy mercy is great above the heavens; and thy truth reacheth unto the clouds."
A passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, says of God: "Not materially but spiritual, we know Him as divine. It is as Life, Truth, and Love. We shall obey and adore in proportion as we apprehend the divine nature and love Him under the corporeality, but rejoicing in the affluence of our God."


D. V. Bible School Pupils In Program
