will be his duty to conduct and organize the publicity and educational campaign. It will be up to him and his organization not only to supply much of the pep and go, so to speak, but he will be entrusted with the dissemination of information through the medium of the press. His will be the job of mobilizing the staff of writers to have charge of the news and advertising work, the distribution of cards and other printed material and to see that the big drive is kept constantly before the public through any phase of the printed word.

Colonel No. 3


"Of equal importance with Colonel No. 1 and 2, will be Colonel No. 3 and his staff, whose work principally will be the organization and direction of the speakers' bureau. Thus, in a way, it will partake somewhat of the same character of work as will be under the direction of Colonel No. 2, but there will really be no conflict. In connection with this speakers' bureau, Colonel No. 3 will maintain information and appointment bureaus, thus schooling and appointing speakers who can go before audiences and explain the great purposes of the drive and tell people what is expected of them."

Mr. Lanz stated that while the organization work was just now in the preliminary state, it would round out into actual accomplishment with great rapidity. He suggested that the public watch the newspapers and listen to the radio with the view of learning every phase of the campaign as it is unfolded.

**MAYOR'S WINGS ARE CLIPPED**

This was a tough week on Mayorality Pride, and ended with a generous clipping of the High-Hat Mayor's wings and a liberal plucking of his proud feathers.

When Mayor Klusman's expense account of \$26.70 for last month was presented to the city council Tuesday night, Councilman Ludlow, watchdog of the city treasury, objected to the mayor to spend city funds for \$6.00 dinners at the Ambassador and the like. Ludlow also questioned the necessity of the mayor making four and five trips a week to attend executive meetings of the Los Angeles County Municipal League.

As a result, the mayor was told before incurring such indebtedness in the future, if he expected the city to pay the bill, he would have to get the council's sanction before the money was spent. In fact, Councilman Wright, who is a member of the finance committee, refused to sign the voucher for Klusman's last month's account of \$26.70, stating that he "doubted the legality" of paying the mayor's bill. Whereupon the mayor threatened to remove Wright from the finance committee and signed the voucher for himself.

But perhaps the worst "plucking" of proud feathers occurred when the council withdrew from the Los Angeles County League of Municipalities by refusing to pay the next quarterly dues of \$15.00. It is to the wide-flung meetings of this organization that Mayor Klusman has been running about all over Southern California at city expense. He has often boasted of being on the "executive committee" of the organization. However, Councilman Ludlow stated that as far as he was able to find out the principal purpose of the league was to separate Southern California from the rest of the state and form a new state, to which he was opposed. And that until the Southern league could find a better purpose for existing he favored staying out of it.

Ludlow stated that the city received much valuable information from the State League of Municipalities and he favored remaining in it, but that the Southern organization was getting too much into politics, and as far as he could see the city was receiving no benefits from membership in it. Mayor Klusman cast the only vote against withdrawing from the Southern league, and lamented that "That kills my vote at Santa Ana tomorrow."

Why Mayor Klusman is spending so much time and city gasoline running all over Southern California making speeches, riding in parades, and indulging in public show of every description is not entirely clear to many citizens. It is rumored, however, that Mayor Klusman has ambitions of being elected to the state legislature at some future date, and that he is trotting around the county "getting acquainted" with folks he hopes will help send him to Sacramento.

**SUPERVISED PLAY FOR BOYS AND GIRLS AT CITY PARK**

Playground Activities Now Going On Under Direction of Official Supervisor; Large Attendance Shown Daily; R. R. Smith Local Director in Charge

Supervised play for boys under the direction of a playground director has been attracting the youth of Torrance for the past week, with more and more boys attending as the news got abroad that there was "something doing" at the new city park.

Activities at the park are under the direction of the Recreation and Playground Association department of the county, and the playground director is on the ground every day except Sunday. Daily average attendance for the past week has been about 50, with boys of all ages enjoying the sports and using the play equipment which has been provided by the City of Torrance.

R. R. Smith, local director, has employed several assistants to carry forward the work.

At the present time all recreation is centered at the new municipal park, but plans are being made to utilize vacant lots in various parts of the town as soon as need for them arises. In order to give the boys beneficial training in citizenship and enable a limited amount of workers to handle a large group of boys, it is proposed to organize a community known as "Boyville." There will be a city government patterned after the government of Torrance, with council, mayor, and all departments handled by the boys. The heads of the various city departments have agreed to tell the boys how their department is run, and to act in an advisory capacity to the city of Boyville. It is felt that this training will be of inestimable value both to the city and the boys.

A tentative program for the following week includes baseball and other games, hiking for nature study, as well as trips to the beach, dog races and the movies. If your boy has been losing out on this he will thank you for telling him about it. Further information can be obtained by calling Torrance 193-J between the hours of 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. and asking for the playground director.

The tentative program for the boys activities is as follows: Friday, August 11. City truck takes boys to the beach, leaving at 10 a. m. and returning at 3 p. m. Bring your own lunch.

Thursday, August 17. Baseball, 9-11 a. m. Drill Games, 1-3 p. m. Organization.

Since the boys' work has been going forward so successfully, arrangements are now being made to establish a playground center for the young girls of Torrance under the direction of Miss Josephine I. Odell who will be in charge of all their activities and plan the programs for each day. All the girls in Torrance are invited to attend and take part in the daily amusements.

The first assembly for the girls will be held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms, on Marcolina avenue, Friday morning, August 11, at 9 o'clock with Miss Odell in charge. Classes in sewing, mending, cooking and all manner of handcraft will be started, and there will be plenty of amusement also, in the way of games, storytelling, and trips to the beach, picture shows and plunges.

Each girl will have the opportunity to express her ideas of the things most useful and entertaining to the group, and the program for the following days will be voted upon. Miss Odell says that the programs will be arranged so that each girl will have at least some of her ideas and plans realized. The group will be organized as a regular woman's club, with officers to have charge, and those who attend the first meetings will be in line for election.

Mothers are assured that the girls will be supervised at all times by an adult capable of caring for them, and their co-operation is greatly desired.

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


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

Training in household arts and handcraft, and ability to supervise games, is essential for those who are to assist in directing the activities of the younger groups.
