


Lomita Woman Is Called By Death

BRINGING NEW WEALTH TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY




Active Harbor Scene. Insets: Profitable and Unusual Foreign Markets.


Within the last five years the total of \$40,914,653 of foreign money has been brought to Los Angeles County through foreign trade—an average of over \$128,000,000 yearly. On the other hand a total of \$234,124,942 has been sent to other countries for raw products and merchandise, leaving a balance of trade in our favor of \$406,789,711 for the five years—an average of \$81,357,985 a year. This is all new money added to the taxable wealth of the community and is cumulative, and affects every resident of the County. For the past five years more than 63 per cent of the gross trade obtained from our export trade has actually stayed right here in Los Angeles County. This is new money. This has been brought about in part through the county exploitation fund and the Foreign Commerce and Shipping Department of the Los Angeles County Chamber of Commerce. The Los Angeles-Long Beach harbor is unique among the principal ports of America in that it is not to appreciable extent a "port of transit." Most of the exports through this harbor originate in this territory. There are major developments under way in the harbor at the present time that are being sponsored directly by the Los Angeles County Chamber of Commerce and the Foreign Trade Department is developing markets for locally manufactured goods that give a direct outlook for our products which, in turn, means work for many people. More tons of American products leave this harbor than any other harbor in the United States. This is no mistake; Government figures prove the state-



"Bottle-Neck" on Western Ave. to Go

Elimination of the "bottle-neck" on Western avenue at the overpass over the Hawthorne line of the Pacific Electric was assured this week when the county road department prepared to widen the bridge from 20 to 60 feet between curbs. The bridge, more than 60 feet above the railroad tracks, also will have a five-foot walk on either side of the roadway. Carnegie steel beams, massive "I" beams some 40 feet long, will be hoisted into place to support the roadway over the tracks when it is widened within the next few days.

Federal Grant Would Speed Up Aqueduct Work

Committee Asks \$25,000,000 For Construction of Water Project

Led by the Long Beach citizens Colorado river water committee, civic groups everywhere in the Metropolitan Water District are this week joining the movement to secure an outright grant from the federal government of approximately \$25,000,000 for the Colorado river aqueduct project.

Securing of such a federal gift, it is pointed out, would enable the district to accelerate its construction schedule and have 14,500 men on the aqueduct payroll by January 1. The funds would be obtained under terms of the National Recovery Act which, it is understood, is being administered so as to permit the government to make an outright grant of money equal to 40 per cent of the cost of materials and labor for the next two years on such projects as the aqueduct.

Twenty-four hundred men are now employed on aqueduct construction work, and under the normal construction program this number is being increased by about 500 men per month, with 5,900 men scheduled to be on the job by January 1. The proposed \$25,000,000 federal gift to the project would allow the district to speed up its building schedule so that 14,500 men would be employed by the first of the year, or 8,100 more than could be employed under the present procedure.

Such acceleration, it is pointed out, would have the effect of materially relieving the unemployment situation in the 13 member cities of the Metropolitan Water District, as well as hastening the bringing in of vitally needed supply of Colorado river water. Early action on the district's application for funds is expected in view of the fact that the Colorado river aqueduct has already been passed upon and approved as a sound, necessary and revenue producing project.
