3340 Additional Employees Added to Staff, Increasing Payroll Over \$8,000,000

New Pauper Act Governs Welfare Work In County

A new state law, the new pauper act, will govern welfare work in Los Angeles county beginning next Monday, according to the county counsel's office, and will affect some 485,000 of the county's population.

The new pauper act, formulated by the state Association of Welfare Executives, restates the financial responsibility of relatives. The present liability of brothers and sisters, grandchildren and grandparents is eliminated, however.

Briefly, the new act requires an indigent to have lived in the state for three years prior to application for aid, and in this county for at least one year preceding. The new act requires a complete investigation before aid is rendered, with periodic visitation and an endeavor to devise ways and
