BLUEBIRDS LOSE EXHIBITION GAME SATURDAY AT COLTON

Louie Neva, Home Run King of National Night League, Electrifies Crowd With Longest Clout Ever Made In Colton Field

He dropped the ball! Poncho Fabregat, "best dog-gone ketcher in the league," is going to have a new glove. In fact Poncho HAS a new glove, and from now on with the big play-off looming on the horizon, Poncho's new glove is going to have to do its duty, and no alibis.

All this because Poncho blamed his old glove for the error that led in a run in the second inning of a tight contest against an all star aggregation of the American Association last Saturday night, played at Colton, when the Birds lost, 3-2.

The Birds went to Colton to play an exhibition game. Rudy Heman was on first, Red Moon on second, and Paul Von derahne on short, otherwise the line-up was as usual.

The All Stars were hand picked. All the best sluggers were there and the All Star manager switched them so fast that Murph and the Birds couldn't get a break.

The All Stars tapped Louie Neva in the second for two hits, but with the stage all set for a perfect clean-up Poncho's old glove got in his way and he dropped the ball. With a man on third and one on first the next batter dropped a single down to Red Moon who stepped on the bag to force the runner from first, flier to Poncho to catch the runner from third. It would have been a perfect play as Poncho had the runner blocked and the ball

smacked into his glove—but popped out again. Louie Neva got the greatest ovation any ball player has had at this field when he stepped to the plate in the third, and drove out the longest home run ever seen here. The fans cheered him wildly for fully 15 minutes, and then realized that with a man ahead of him on the paths he had tied the score.

A homer by Luke in the fifth won the game for the All Stars. It was a game the Birds deserved to win, as they played a spectacular brand of ball. Paul Vonderahne in short in place of Joe Storti covered all the territory there was, and accepted all chances. Red Moon had a perfect day at bat, with three hits out of three times at bat.

Because only one umpire showed up to handle the game between Huntington Beach and the Bluebirds last Friday night, which game was lost by the Birds, 5 to 3, on errors, Manager Spud Murphy has lodged a protest with the association and the game may be played over again, if the protest is allowed at tonight's league meeting at Costa Mesa.

While there is no specific rule in the book to cover such a situation, the understanding is that in case there is a shortage of umpires, the managers of the opposing teams are entitled to pick some one from the stands to fill in for the emergency, but according to Murphy, Umpire Wentz would not permit Rodgers and Murph to do this, saying it was contrary to the regulations.

However, it is a physical impossibility for one man to umpire an indoor ball game as the action is entirely too fast. "For an umpire to judge the balls and strikes, and at the same time to watch the base runners to see that nobody leaves the base ahead of time, just can't be done," said Spud, "and therefore I am taking the matter up with the league officials. The loss of this game means nothing to me, but it does mean a whole lot to the two teams which are battling the leaders for first place."

Trojan fans are already helping out Coach Howard Jones by selecting his team for him and here is how most of them name his first eleven: Right end, Ford Palmer, brilliant pass catcher and hard blocker, 197 pounds; right tackle, Hueston Harper, shot put star in track and reserve for Ernie Smith here last year, 215 pounds; or George Ludy, 228-pound reserve; right guard, Larry Stevens, regular 200, reserve last year; center, Curt Young, 192, regular last year; left guard, Aaron Rosenberg, good blocker but especially effective on defense, 210; left tackle, Bob (King) Kong, 220-pounder sometimes called the "Boy giant" by his team mates because he won't stop growing—weighed 170 pounds and played end as a freshman in 1930; left end, Julius Pecos, 175-pound reserve, or Ward Browning, 190, reserve last year.

Quarterback, Homer Griffith, 185, like All-American Gaius Shaver in his versatility as driving or elusive ball carrier and triple threat man; left half, Bob (Toosh) McNeish, 180, reserve last year, excellent blocker; right half, "Brick" Bright, 201, or Cal Clemens, 185, and fullback, Gordon Clark, 178.

Should Coach Jones use this lineup, taking the first named man in the positions where two are mentioned the weight averages would be 222 pounds for the line and 186 for the backfield, with a grand average of 196 pounds for the eleven. This would be the biggest team the Trojans have ever had, which would be a fortunate thing for Troy's "head man" what with Loyola, Washington State, St. Mary's, Oregon State at Portland and California at Berkeley being met on successive Saturdays during the first half of the season, and Stanford, Oregon, Notre Dame at South Bend, Georgia and Washington being the opponents during the second half.

The Trojan team as in the past will be typically Californian in that all members of the first eleven but one will be graduates of California high schools. The exception is Bob Erskine, but as he is an Iowa he is accepted as a Californian since a great part of Iowa's population now resides in the nearby city of Long Beach.

Trojans Start Practice Sept. 16 With 18 Lettermen Returning

LOS ANGELES—With less than a month remaining before Pacific Coast Conference football practice will be in full swing, followers of the University of Southern California Trojans, unbeaten in their last 20 games, are beginning to take stock of their team's chances to continue its victorious march.

Favoring the Trojans hopes to stay at the top are the facts that Southern California has eight returning regulars, will have an unusually powerful team and will have experienced men for every position but tackle. Obstacles to continued Trojan supremacy are an unusually heavy schedule with three trips away from home, improved teams on the part of most of S. C.'s opponents and the fact that the season's objective on the part of practically every rival will be to beat Southern California.

When the Trojans start practice with the rest of the conference universities on September 16, it is expected that 18 letter men of last year's squad will return. Of the 11 missing letter men, the Trojans will lose four real stars in Tay Brown and Ernie Smith, one of the greatest tackle combinations in football history; Ray Sparling, the bull-carrying end who made the "Sparling reverse" the strongest play in Trojan running attack; and Orv Mohler, hard-running quarterback. Mohler, however, was not a regular at the close of 1932 as he was forced to quit the game in mid-season with a neck injury.

Returning to the team the Southern Californians will have one of the country's sturdiest and most versatile ends in captain Ford Palmer, a pair of big experienced guards in Larry Stevens and Aaron (Rosy) Rosenberg; a veteran, dependable center in Curt Youel and one of the most rugged boys in football in 220-pound Bob Erskine, last year a halfback but this season a tackle.

In the backfield Homer Griffith, the triple threat artist who kicks and passes 65 yards will be back at quarterback with Gordon Clark, fullback at the close of last season, and "Brick" Bright, halfback, also returning. Bright was shifted from left half to right half during spring practice and here he will have a battle for the position with another rugged blocker, Cal Clemens. Clark may go to left half if Cliff Propp, a freshman fullback last year, shows varsity possibilities, but if Clark stays at full, Bob McNeish, a reserve last fall, will probably win the left half post.

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MERCHANTS TRIM NIPPONS IN SPECTACULAR GAME SUNDAY
