Motor Vehicle Registrations Are Advancing

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 30.—Seen as another sure indication of returning prosperity, motor vehicle registrations are advancing sharply in California.

In a report filed today with Governor James Rolph, Jr. by Theo. J. Roche, director of the department of motor vehicles, it was said the increase had been mounting steadily for the last four months, coincident with President Roosevelt's national recovery program.

The total gain for the months of April, May, June and July was reported by Roche as being 23,486 over the corresponding period of 1932.

Total fee-paid registrations for the period amounted to 122,732. License fees collected during the period amounted to \$617,084, a gain of \$14,356 over last year. Rallying sharply after the worst quarterly slump in the department's history, registrations gained approximately 4,000 in April. Gains for the succeeding months were proportionate to the general upturn in business conditions. The July gain was more than 8900 vehicles.

Roche expressed confidence that a substantial gain over the entire year of 1932 would be made by the end of the current year despite first-quarter losses.

State Board Approves New Link In Highway

Final approval was given by the state department of public works this week to the newest link of the Roosevelt highway, a section of 14 miles in the city of Redondo Beach.

Work has been under way for several months on the link, which extends between "I" street and Elena avenue.

The county road department reports that practically all deeds have been secured for extending Sepulveda between Ballona creek and Venice boulevard. The bridge was constructed several years ago, and has since stood unused, high and dry. Efforts now are being made to secure dedications south of Ballona creek.

Driver Tells Early Results Ford V-8 Run

Eddie Pullen Driving 10-Day Test Gives Tips On Economy

With only two more days to go in his 10-day continuous "Ford V-8 Fact-Finding Economy Run" through Torrance and 20 nearby cities, Eddie Pullen today made the first public report of his progress.

"So far on the test, no oil has been added between the refills at 1000-mile intervals," Pullen stated. "Also, the radiator is sealed and we do not expect to add water within the entire 10 days. As for gasoline consumption—that can't very well be reported at this time, because guessing contests on this feature of the run are now being conducted by Schultz & Peckham, the local Ford dealer, and by the other dealers in cities along the route. However, gasoline mileage figures will be released as soon as the test ends next Saturday.

"Under the same conditions, I think the average good driver can duplicate the records that we are setting on this run," Pullen continued. "Without attempting high speeds, we are easily averaging 45 to 55 miles per hour on the road, but we observe traffic limits carefully within the cities. In this way we are giving the car a fair trial at normal driving speeds and not 'nursing it along' to save fuel and oil.

Advices Slower Starting. However, anyone who expects the greatest economy from a modern car with a high-compression motor must follow a few positive rules that every good automobile engineer or professional driver advises.

"In the first place, don't be too quick on the getaway. In any car, the three rapid accelerations from low to second, from second to high and high to top speed will burn up more gas than you would use over a considerable stretch in normal driving. The 'kick' of being first away isn't worth its expense to most people.

"Another common mistake is to overwork the motor by driving below 15 miles per hour in high gear. Under this speed, use second gear. For the modern second is noiseless, powerful, and has greater driving flexibility in slow traffic. In the new Ford V-8, you can go up to 65 miles per hour in second, or as slow as you like without strain."

Revenue Bureau Warns Merchants Against Fakers

The bureau of internal revenue has had its attention called to several cases in which business concerns have been solicited to purchase certain forms in connection with keeping records for federal tax purposes. In some instances the salesman has intimated that he was an officer of the government or that the forms and services that he offered for sale had been approved by the bureau of internal revenue.

For the information of the public, the bureau wishes definitely to state that it has not indorsed or approved, nor authorized any of its officers or employees to indorse or approve, any particular accounting system or any prescribed forms for keeping accounts or rendering federal tax returns issued by a private individual or firm. Instructions of the bureau of internal revenue specifically prohibit its employees from officially indorsing or aiding in the promotion of any private enterprise.
