**Stars Used In New Method of Determining Boundary Lines**

Owners of real estate in this community and other sections of the county soon will have a convenient means of determining the exact boundary lines of their property with the start of the triangulation survey by the county surveyor's department. "Starting points" throughout the

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**Small Crowd of Local Workers Attend Meeting**

R. W. P. U. Call For Mass Meeting Tuesday Gets Small Response

A small crowd of about 50 persons assembled at the residence of W. H. Smith, 1554 West 218th street, Tuesday night in response to the call of the Relief Workers Protective Union for a mass meeting to discuss matters to be laid before the board of supervisors and the county welfare department.

Among the propositions listed in a circular letter sent out to various units in this territory are a demand for a six-hour day at a scale of \$1 per day, with a minimum employment of 10 days per family and two days additional for each dependent, during each 30 days; seven days for single workers during each 30 days; immediate abolition of all unpaid (forced) labor; relief which is not to work orders for all unemployed; opposition to evictions and cutting off utilities; repeal of the sales tax and tax the rich; moratorium on taxes and assessments for two years, no foreclosures on mortgages and trust deeds of all small home owners; recognition of committees of unemployed in all welfare offices.

Organizations claimed in the circular to be joining with the United Front Conference Against Hunger, with headquarters at 741 Wall street, Los Angeles, under which caption the circular information and appeal was set forth, were the Relief Workers Protective Union, Hondo, Protective League, Area Group of San Pedro, Socialist party branches at Lynwood and South Gate; Communist Party; American Voters Association; Trade Union Unity League; Highland Park Youth Club; Unemployed Taxpayers Association; Area Group No. 26; seven U. C. R. A. units not named; Young Communist League; Women's Council; International Labor Defense, and the Unemployed Veterans of Torrance. Managers of the Torrance Unemployed Veterans Relief Association, and the Carson Street Unemployed Relief, denied that either of them had associated themselves with the group or had authorized the use of their names or were taking any part in the movement, which is in preparation for a widespread "hunger march" called for October 2.

**Enrollment At Narbonne High Is Increased**

Total For Opening Day of New Semester Shows 744 Pupils

Enrollment figures for the opening day of school at Narbonne high school showed an increase of 45 pupils over the total registered on the opening day last year. This year 744 pupils entered the classes, as against 699 for 1932. Increase in this total by next Monday is expected as a number of late comers will register during the first few days of school.

Practically no changes in personnel have been made at Narbonne, according to Principal Clementina de Forest Griffin, with the exception of one new teacher, Dewey Roland, and two substitute teachers who are filling in at posts until the regular teacher arrives. Miss Ada Gunn is substituting for Miss Holloway who has been on a trip to Europe, and who has been delayed in reaching home.

Miss Isabel Jackson is substituting for Miss Chadwick, who has been traveling in Mexico. Miss Chadwick was involved in an airplane accident, and while the plane was demolished when it crashed on a mountain top, no one was injured, but the party was forced to travel on muleback to the railroad with consequent interruption to the schedule.

At the Orange street school, a total of 371 pupils were registered, which, according to Principal Hilda Jellison, is about the same enrollment with which the school closed last spring. Some classes are being held on half-day sessions at the school, owing to the failure of the school board to order repairs to the rooms damaged by fire last year.

One additional teacher, Miss Veronica Carroll, has been assigned to duty. She will have charge of the music department. Three teachers were added to the staff at the Lomita elementary school, according to Miss Harriet Michaels, principal. They are Miss Rennie Jean Gregory, A-2, who has returned to the school after a year's absence; Mrs. Lena Gaertner, A-1 B-2; and Mrs. Mary Paisley, A-3 B-4.

**Local Oil Fields Curtail Production**

Production at the Inglewood, Lawndale and Torrance oil fields was under curtailment today following adoption of the NRA code which went into effect September 8. Allotment for California crude production now is limited to 480,000 barrels daily. Just prior to the code's effective date, annual oil production reached the highest day's production in more than two years, 521,717 barrels, on September 7. Production at the local wells for the week ending Friday, September 8, was as follows: Inglewood, 11,900 barrels; Lawndale, 250 barrels, and Torrance, 6500 barrels.
