Colden Speaks to Members of Voters League

Enthusiastic Audience Gives Close Attention to Local Congressman

At the last meeting of the league, Congressman Charles J. Colden delivered a fine address on general topics of the day, with an appeal to the audience to support President Franklin D. Roosevelt in his undertakings for the good of the country. He is a real leader, said Colden, and is earnestly trying to help the "forgotten man." The New Deal is a new era and order. Rugged individualism is now a thing of the past.

Congressman Colden spoke of his experiences in Washington during his first session in Congress and presented many interesting side-lights on affairs there. He explained his position on many questions, such as inflation, the recognition of Russia, the right of the worker to collective bargaining, the balanced budget. His remarks were received with loud applause.

At the conclusion of the congressman's remarks, a resolution was adopted by the members of the league to be presented to the executive council for forwarding to N. R. A. headquarters which advocated the adoption of a six-hour day which would make it necessary for factories to put more men to work.

Tomorrow night the league urges all interested citizens to attend the benefit program to be presented at the Lomita Theatre on behalf of the unemployed. A real opportunity to help one's neighbor is offered by this benefit. The proceeds from which will go to relieve many necessities among distressed families of Lomita.

Officers of the league wish to correct the impression lately gone out that the Unemployment Relief headquarters has been closed. The headquarters is still open and functioning. The Community Relief, an entirely different concern, has been closed temporarily.

Mystery Seen In Cause of Injury to Del Rey Man

Otha Frank, age 73, residing on Ocean Front, Del Rey, who was brought to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital about 5:30 Saturday afternoon suffering from a fractured skull, is improving slightly but is still unable to give a rational account of the cause of his injury.

Frank was found in his room by his friend and employer, E. Duncan, proprietor of a fishing tackle store at Del Rey, who investigated when Frank failed to show up for work on Saturday.

Frank was found unconscious in his room which was greatly disarranged. Authorities are at a loss to know whether Frank had been attacked by a hand and left senseless, or whether he had suffered a slight stroke and had sustained the head injuries in a fall.

The aged man is rational at times and apparently gaining strength but all attempts to question him as to the circumstances surrounding his mysterious injury have been unsuccessful. He has been unable to give any details, or to tell the whereabouts of relatives.

Four Men Facing Trial In Spanish Land Grant Cases

November 14 has been set for the trial of the four men charged with conspiracy to violate the postal laws in connection with their activities in collecting fees from would-be homesteaders on land in the Palos Verdes Hills and other old Spanish land grant lands in Los Angeles, Orange and San Diego counties, by order of the United States district court.

The defendants are Williamson S. Summers, H. Newkirk Wheeler, Harry C. White and Othie A. Adams. The quartet was indicted a year ago following an exhaustive investigation by investigators for the federal and office of the department of the interior.

The government's charges against the men are that they induced would-be homesteaders to file applications with the local land office for acreage plots, in the belief that they still were open to public entry. Fees collected by the quartet are said to be nearly \$750,000.

Millions Needed For County Care of Impoverished

Deputy Counsel To Plead In Washington For Share of Relief Funds

More than \$2,000,000 will have been extended to Los Angeles county to enable it to care for its indigents in this and other sections during July, August and September. It was revealed today in a compilation made by the county counsel's office.

The total of \$2,100,000, or an average of \$700,000 per month, will tide the county over until \$250,000,000 is made available to states and counties under the Wagner-Lewis bill without requiring that any of it be matched by local funds.

John R. Quinn, chairman of the board of supervisors, was in San Francisco Friday negotiating for \$12,000,000 of relief bond money for Los Angeles county, which is expected to be available the first of the year. This is equivalent to \$2 for every \$1 paid out of county taxes.

Between September 30 and January 1 the county must depend upon the Wagner-Lewis federal aid bill, which is being modified. Some time this month the supervisors will send Douglas DeCoster, deputy county counsel, to Washington to negotiate for these funds, in order that the county may have money to feed its needy after January 1, it was learned today at the Hall of Records.

There is declared to be ample funds on hand to carry the county over into the new year, with tax collections to come in December 7, and with \$3,848,498 set up in the 1933-34 budget for welfare. The county's total need for welfare purposes is estimated roundly at \$24,000,000, which is expected to obtain from the local taxation, the state relief bonds voted last June 27 and the \$250,000 Wagner-Lewis bill.
