GREAT BASEBALL TEAM WINS TRIBUTE FROM SPORTWRITER

Riverside Expert Hails Louie (the Great) Neva as "Terror Ace" After Bluebirds Shut-out Rialto For Second Time In World Series; Home Game Tomorrow May Be Last

High tribute is paid Louie Neva and the Torrance Bluebirds by Wilber Fogelman, sports writer of the Riverside Enterprise, in a signed story which appeared last night, under the heading of, "Neva Tames Rialto 2 to 0 Again, As Torrance Widens Gap—Stars Unable to Deliver in Many Pinches."

"However, he had plenty of opposition in Venn Botts, as was the case Monday at Anaheim and once more Venn was the victim of bad breaks. For the boys might yet be running up a huge electric light bill on the city if Howard Rialto's stealing short stop, hadn't suffered one bad inning and heaved two wild throws into a fence behind first base and home plate.

"These hurried tosses and Neva's clout were all that it took to turn the tide, the Rialtans giving Botts sensational support otherwise. "The American Leaguers weren't without their moments, however. They had runners on the pads in every inning, save the ninth, as did Torrance, which should be some kind of a record. In short, a total of ten runners left on bases is a real cause of their demerit with the Terror Ace who, if they had them up superbly, the Rialtans simply failed miserably in the clinches of which there were many."
