## Seek Grant of Federal Funds For Western

State Advisory Board Studies Application For Highway Financial Aid

Of the \$335,260 which it is proposed to expend upon the improvement of Western avenue between Electric street and 104th street, to provide a more adequate route into Los Angeles, the sum of \$127,177 would go for labor and \$178,881 for materials.

This was noted in a check-up today with the detailed plans on file with the state advisory board, which now is studying the application. Thirty per cent of the total cost of \$91,817 is sought as a grant from the government under the terms of the national public works bill. The balance would be paid back over a 20-year period from gasoline tax receipts beginning in 1936.

The existing pavement is to be widened by the addition of a 10-foot cement concrete strip on either side of the existing 20-foot strip of asphaltic concrete. The new paving is to be laid upon a disintegrated rock base, and on either side of the new pavement eight-foot disintegrated rock, and oil shoulders are to be constructed, with drainage structures, pursuant of the plans reveals. This would provide a 56-foot artery. A section of Western avenue through the city of Gardena already has been improved to this width, and no work will be done there.

Cost of the various types of work are given as follows: Grading, \$37,181; cement pavement, \$18,200; asphaltic concrete paving, \$48,503; disintegrated rock base, \$45,715; shoulders, \$21,976; drainage structures, \$22,000; reinforced concrete bridge to be widened over Pacific Electric tracks, \$37,200; engineering charges, \$22,942; interest during construction, \$9260.

Of the \$154,380 proposed to expend on Normandie avenue, between Electric street and 114th street, \$180,847 would go for labor and \$241,302 for materials, the application reveals. Amount sought as an outright grant under the terms of the federal bill is \$126,615. Thirty-foot cement paving, with shoulders, and one separation of grades is provided for, the latter item to cost \$24,362.

homes furniture and carpets and have been discarded long ago. Repapering, remodeling and refurbishing have been put off from month to month. Members of the household have allowed their wardrobes to become depleted. In the case of factories and business houses, equipment has been allowed to run down and a general program of replenishment and rehabilitation is long overdue. Hence, we feel that we are well within the bounds of good business judgment when we say "NOW IS THE TIME TO BUY."

"As to our plans here in Torrance, we are keeping our old Blue Eagle organization intact. There will be a lot of work for all of us to do as the program advances. In the first place, every member of our committee is to be a salesman for this great movement. During this 12 weeks of increased effort they will spread the gospel of "NOW IS THE TIME TO BUY." We realize that an organization of loyal men and women such as we have here in Torrance, thoroughly imbued with the idea of doing everything possible to help stimulate business and end the depression, can make themselves a tremendously powerful force.

"I want the business men of the city who have signed up under the Blue Eagle and who have been so successful in their cooperation with Uncle Sam in this great effort, to know that we intend to do everything we can to stimulate trade for them. We believe that with an effort of this kind going on in every community of the United States, business can really be lifted out of the rut and the happy days of prosperity brought back to our land.

"We want the co-operation of everybody—the press, the pulpit, the schools, the radio, the motion picture houses and the various clubs and civic organizations and, of course, the general public. We are not going to ask anyone to make any great sacrifices. We are going to conduct this effort along sound, practical lines and we are not going to urge anyone to spend money that they really can't afford to spend. We know that prosperity can't be brought back that way. But, at the same time, we know that there is a vast amount of deferred buying in this community. There is still some unemployment here, I admit, but the vast majority of families in this city are in a position to help swell the grand total of business activity. There are things that can and should be purchased in almost every home.

"The government has organized this program in order to give the people of the country a chance to pull themselves out of the depression. Washington will operate with us in many ways but it is up to us to do our part. If we do our part and every other community in the United States does its part, the depression that has hung on now like a plague for the last four years will soon be a thing of the past."



## Hints For The Amateur Gardener

Through an arrangement with Harry Nelson, Los Angeles gardening expert, the Herald will offer each week a timely article on the proper planting and cultivation of seasonal flowers. Mr. Nelson will answer all questions relating to gardening, either through this column or by direct communication. A word about vegetables this week would hardly be wrong for our winter planting should be in now. It is possible to plant any time of the year in our climate but there are certain months in which the various plants will do best. Of the vegetables to plant now, heads head the list, using the Detroit dark red, Brussels sprouts and cabbage may be planted, as well as mustard, cauliflower and turnips. In the latter case, the purple top white globe is the best although it takes longer to mature. Radishes may be planted, using white lelate or scarlet turnip white tip. Spinach of the prickly winter type does well and should be planted as soon as the hot spell is over.

### Lettuce Does Well

If the home gardener wants lettuce he should try the Los Angeles market variety, for it does the best here and gives more assurance of a crop. We can also put in parsnips, onions or onion sets, kale, leek, kohi rabi, salsify and peas. If the weather is cool we can get a crop of peas early in the year. Of the root crops the good one on this item. It is very good. Do not forget that vegetables, like all other growing things, need plenty of fertilizer. It is good to work in some manure if it is well rotted, before planting the seed. If the manure is old enough it will act both as a mulch for the plants and as the required fertilizer.

### Crops Need Food

When the crop is well along, a side-dressing of some commercial fertilizer is a help. That is, if the crop is not already growing rapidly. This side dressing can be nitrate of soda or a complete fertilizer such as Velvet Plant Food, Vigoro, or Loma. Any of the commercial fertilizers carrying the three plant elements will help in giving the final touch to the plant. Before long I hope to tell more of the fertilizers; what they are and how to use them. The same applies to vegetable varieties.

### Lilies Satisfy

Now, to drop the vegetables for awhile and take up the various seasonal things, we come to the lilies. There are some fine ones on the market and although you may not have been successful with them before, you can grow them quite easily. In fact, under the right conditions, you may count on as many as 30 blooms for the right lily planted and left for three years. I know of one instance where the regal lily gave 40 blooms in the length of time. Of course they should not be disturbed when once planted. They like (most of them) a place where the base is in shade but where the top can get into the sun. Shrubbery is a fine place, or under a pergola.

### Leopard Lily is Showy

There are a good many lilies on the market at the present time and the buyer can find from the various catalogs just what depth to plant in each case. The Madonna lily for instance wants about three or four inches depth while the regal lily wants as much as six inches of soil on top of it. ### Lazy Man's Dream



The average gardener will be interested to find that they require no care or water during their dormant period. In fact they are a lazy man's dream of a fine garden subject. The brodiaeus or onion flower are in the same class and require the same care. They, too, are worth having.

## Plans For Sewer Are Approved As Directors Meet

Formal approval of plans and the method of procedure to be followed in constructing the \$2,750,000 White Point outfall sewer, to serve Bell, Maywood, Cudahy, Compton, Torrance, Inglewood and other communities in the southern part of the county, was given Wednesday at a meeting of the directors at the Hall of Records. At the same time, the directors authorized A. K. Warren, chief engineer, to file the application he has prepared for a federal loan, asking \$1,980,000 as a loan and \$810,000 as an outright grant, representing 30 per cent of the estimated cost of the project. Warren also was authorized to negotiate settlements with landowners in the Palos Verdes area for right-of-way for lines to be considered as part of the outfall. Approval also was given Warren, on motion of Director Pomeroy of South Gate, to approve the remainder of the Compton Creek sewer in the amount of \$200,000. Part of Wednesday's meeting was given over to discussion of the advisability of constructing the outfall entirely by district forces, instead of by contract. Warren told the directors, in answer to a question by Mayor Kinney of Bell, that there were nearly enough funds on hand to start the project going and get it well under way. Later, however, it was decided to apply for the federal loan.
