Spotlight for Lomita, please! We are going to be a famous city. Without waiting to consult the Halloween oracles we predict that while San Pedro and San Francisco may fight for the next half century over which is the harbor town, Lomita will be famous as the "hobby" town.

We raise fine chickens, rare fruits, have the largest celery patch in the world, and the champion football team, and now archeologists are coming to Lomita to see our rare collections of Indian relics.

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SUDDEN HEART ATTACK FATAL TO PIONEER LOMITA RESIDENT

Golie M. Lewis Stricken While Motoring With Wife and Daughter Through Palos Verdes Hills Saturday Afternoon

Death came suddenly and apparently painlessly to Golie Martin Lewis Saturday afternoon about 3:30 when he collapsed in the car as he, with Mrs. Lewis and their daughter, Carol, were returning from the Palos Verdes hills. Mrs. Lewis drove rapidly home and summoned Dr.

Fuller who pronounced Mr. Lewis past human aid. At the inquest, held at the Stone & Myers mortuary, Torrance, death was found due to a heart attack.

Mr. Lewis was born in Missouri May 5, 1884, later moving to Arizona. Twenty-two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Lewis were married at Riverside, California, and shortly afterwards moved to their home on the corner of Miller and Narbonne avenue, where they have since resided.

Four children were born to them, one son, Walter, dying in infancy. Survivors are the widow, Cora M., sons, James Robert, aged 20, Richard, 15, and daughter, Carol, who was 13 years old Saturday, and a sister, Mrs. Mollie Steeper, and niece, Miss Lila Steeper, the latter two living in Los Angeles.

Services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Calvary Evangelical church of which Mr. and Mrs. Lewis were charter members. Rev. James Lynd officiated and interment took place at Inglewood.

In the many years Mr. Lewis had lived in Lomita he had always taken an active part for the betterment of the community and was noted for his loyalty to church and friends and his devotion to his family. The community mourns the passing of a good citizen.
