Interesting Exhibit of Brass and China Shown

Members of the Torrance Women's Club enjoyed an unusually fine exhibit of old brass and china at the clubhouse, Engracia avenue, Wednesday afternoon in conjunction with their home economics program arranged by the program chairman, Mrs. O. W. Hudson.

Many lovely old pieces were shown. A collection from Mrs. Isabelle Henderson contained a Turkish coffee set of brass and china combination. Pieces of Flemish, Dutch, English and Oriental brass in candlesticks and small boxes. These pieces were arranged in a group on a table cloth which Mrs. Henderson brought from Anam Cambodia. The scarf had faces embroidered around it and no two faces were alike.

Mrs. Willis Brooks had a display of china 200 years old. Mrs. Hudson had in her display a pitcher made of black luster, which her great grandmother brought from England. The pitcher is 170 years old. Mrs. Taylor displayed brass from Damascus Syria, and several interesting pieces from Arabia.

Mrs. F. H. Clark had in her display a set of pewter play dishes which were purchased in England in 1788. She also had in her collection an old mug of lovely china. This mug was owned by a relative of Mrs. Clark, Henry Blackwood, who fought with the New England troops in the battle of Bunker Hill. This relative was an aide to General George Washington and on one occasion Washington used the mug as a shaving mug.

Luncheon speakers included Miss Alice Burger, Junior Red Cross chairman, and Miss Louise Floyd from the Los Angeles Red Cross headquarters. Mrs. Collins, local Red Cross chairman, announced that the annual roll call will begin very soon.
