Improved Sound System Installed In Lomita Theatre

This week marked the debut of the new RCA Victor High Fidelity sound system at the Lomita Theatre, and the setting of a new high mark in the quality of theatre sound in Lomita.

The new equipment, which is similar to the type recently installed in the new Radio City super-theatres in Rockefeller Centre, New York, provided a quality of reproduction that was revolutionary. According to Mr. Baker, manager of the Lomita Theatre, the new system is actually capable of reproducing a wider range of sound than many of the motion pictures now made can provide.

In the first public demonstration of the new system and during the showing of the feature picture last Thursday, decided improvement was noticeable in the natural quality of the actors' speaking voices, particularly of women's voices, heretofore the most difficult to record and reproduce because of the high frequencies involved. Mr. Baker reports. With the new High Fidelity apparatus, audible sounds in a range of from 60 to 10,000 cycles are faithfully reproduced with all the delicate shadings of the human voice which are so distinguishable in actual speech. This "dynamic" shading of tone is just as apparent in the sonorous volume of a full symphony orchestra, Mr. Baker says.
