The paper that was received from Latvia recently by the World Friendship Club has been translated by Mrs. Jaumssen, mother of Olga Jaumssen, a former student at Torrance high school. It was sent in response to a portfolio that the World Friendship Club sent to a Latvian high school last year. In the paper were reproduced two pictures of Torrance high. The accompanying article was translated by Mrs. Jaumssen, a native of Latvia, as follows:
"Received from Torrance an album with pictures of orange groves, city of Torrance, and its school group pictures of children in school activities. The scenes of California are extraordinarily beautiful, especially those of the desert, mountains, and orange groves. The processes of industry in California, we think, are very interesting. We have received also albums from Yugoslavia, Belgium, Japan, Chile, Australia, Norway, Italy, Denmark, Peru, Lithuania, Greece, and Canada. We think it very educational to receive these albums and plan to compose one of our own country that we may return the compliment which has made us so happy to receive."

Radiators Will Be Installed In County Unemployment Office

Branch offices of the county welfare bureau in this and a half dozen other cities were assured of heating facilities today by an order of the board of supervisors.

Installation of radiators was ordered to proceed at once in the following branch offices, estimates being given in either case: East Compton, \$168; West Compton, \$258; Torrance, \$103; Pomona, \$260; San Fernando, \$230; Santa Monica, \$185; Whittier, \$189.

William Davidson, county mechanical engineer, was instructed to complete the installations as soon as possible. Total new outlay for the various offices was given as \$1772, with an allowance of not to exceed \$500 for labor. Davidson was given instructions to remove the pipes and fittings from the premises when they are vacated. No provision was made for the Pico office because it was not yet located.
