and glazed nuts belong on the holiday table.  
**GLAZED NUTS**  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
1-3 cup white corn syrup  
2 cups nuts  
Cook together the sugar, water and corn syrup, stirring until sugar is dissolved; then cook without stirring, until syrup reaches 300° F., very brittle. Wipe down the sides of the pan with a damp cloth from time to time to prevent crystals forming. Remove from fire and drop nuts in, one at a time, and remove with fork or candy dipper to a flat, greased slab, or to heavy waxed paper. Take special care to take up only enough syrup to coat the surface so that the base will not spread when allowed to harden. Almost any kind of nut will do.

## GETTING READY FOR THANKSGIVING

With Thanksgiving next Thursday, it's time to go over our Thanksgiving dinner and entertainment plans and have them well in hand. The linen, silver, glassware and dishes should be washed and ready for the turkey and its accompaniments. For after all an aristocrat like the turkey should have the proper setting.  
The table itself should come in for its share of pre-Thanksgiving attention. The centerpiece, place cards, and general color scheme should be planned and made some days previous to the great occasion. A pumpkin will make an excellent centerpiece if it is marked off into sections lengthwise, about 3 inches wide, carefully removing every other section so that a pumpkin shell is left with four or six window effects. Of course, the top and bottom of the pumpkin are left intact, inside this place nuts, grapes, cranberries and other small fall fruits with some tumbling out all over the table through the holes in the pumpkin.  
Conecob candle holders, made by leveling off the bottom of ears of corn and hollowing out the tops so that they will hold candles in fall colors, make effective Thanksgiving table decorations. Bright fall leaves may be scattered here and there over the table and add to the galaxy of color. Particularly large bright leaves might be shellacked to form a basis for the place cards when slips of stiff paper are pasted on at the stems. Several leaves might be fastened to a paper dollie for use under the opening cocktail or finishing sherbet. In fact, Nature, herself, might be arranging this Thanksgiving table.

outstanding citizens to the board, to represent that city's interest as does the second district supervisor in Los Angeles.  
Other proposals of the league, through charter changes: 3) Fill vacancies on the board of supervisors between elections by the supervisors instead of by appointment of the governor; 4) limit expenditure under bond issues to the amount specified in the issue; 5) co-ordinate the sheriff's city police and constables offices; 6) fix salaries of department heads by the charter; 7) limit duty of public defender to cases where the accused cannot afford to employ counsel; 8) abolish present special tax levy in civil service and include this in general assessment.
