

HARBOR CITY SCHOOL HOLD OPEN HOUSE ON WEDNESDAY

Pupils Will Display Work and Each Classroom Will Put On Program; Kindergarteners Build Model City of Cardboard

Wednesday is open house at the Harbor City school, all afternoon and evening, and there will be a display of work done by the pupils as well as a classroom program in each room, all the settings and articles used being made by the pupils.

The kindergarteners have made a city, their own town Harbor City, with the buildings of cardboard.

Part of the play, "Hobbit" will be given by the third grade who have made a Swiss setting in their room, mountains, ice, and a Swiss cottage being presented.

The fourth and fifth grades have constructed a log cabin and will give three episodes in the lives of the Pilgrims.

The A2 and B3 room has an Indian wigwam with Indian blankets, and a setting for Hiawatha which they will present.

One of the finest settings is the complete Spanish patio, made by the sixth grade, who will present a Mexican market scene, the children having made pottery, Mexican foods, everything to present a real Mexican scene. Several instructors from other elementary schools have visited this room to admire the work.

The first graders will give a play, the "Toy Shop," the children having made all the toys used.

In the evening there will be the room programs and also a skit by the American Legion prepared by Grady Gentry, and a one-act comedy by the P. T. A., directed by Mrs. Dow. Characters in this play will be portrayed by Mesdames Powell, Schroeder, Mitchell, Davenport, Messrs. Dow and Lowell. Center, with Miss Maxine Schatz in the leading role, a stage-struck maiden who does her rehearsing in a boarding house to the consternation of the other boarders, who think her either crazy or involved in a murder.

The Glee Club, under the direction of Miss Ethel Crosby, will sing, and Miss Becker, playground director will present 27 emblems to the boy champions of the school.

For the first time in four years the school is making a charge for an entertainment. The admission is very small and will be used in school welfare work.

First Annual Football Relay Held Tomorrow

Narbonne and Bell Will Start the Game At 1:45 O'Clock

Ten leading schools in the five city high schools leagues will take part tomorrow in the first annual high school football relay at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

The schools are divided into north and south divisions with Manual Arts, Los Angeles, Beverly Hills, Bell and Eagle Rock in the northern division and Fremont, Washington, Jefferson, Narbonne and San Pedro, the southern group.

At the end of each period the fresh teams will take the field at the spot where the ball was declared dead and go on from there. The entire net proceeds will go to the Parent Teachers Association for welfare work in the Los Angeles city schools.
