

McMULLEN PLEADS GUILTY TO MISAPPLICATION OF FUNDS

Former Lomita Bank Manager Secretly Indicted by Federal Grand Jury; Ordered to Report for Sentence January 22

Frank Wallace McMullen formerly of Torrance, former manager of the Lomita branch of the California Bank, who was secretly indicted by the federal grand jury last Wednesday, pleaded guilty to charges of misapplication of bank funds and asked for probation.

McMullen, who was replaced at the local bank last summer, was ordered to report back in Federal Judge Harry Holtzer's court January 22 for sentence at which time it will be decided whether or not probation will be granted.

The secret indictment returned against McMullen followed several months of investigation by the United States attorney's office, during which time the bank's books were gone over thoroughly, according to Assistant U. S. Attorney Utley. The grand jury investigation was directed by Assistant U. S. Attorney Palmer.

Amount of McMullen's pecuniations was given as \$1925, and the total involved a number of items on the books, ranging from \$5 to \$397. At the time of his arrest when the United States marshal served him with a warrant, he stated he would plead guilty, according to Attorney Utley. McMullen first appeared in court Tuesday, but asked for additional time in which to make his plea, and it was continued until Wednesday, when he again appeared and pleaded guilty to all charges.

Judge Holtzer also reduced McMullen's bail from \$2000 to \$1000, with the consent of the district attorney's office.

Fate of Lomita Elementary Not Yet Determined

Fate of the Lomita elementary school building still is not known by the Los Angeles board of education, it was learned yesterday.


