### JUDGE RIPPY SPEAKS ON COMMON LAW

Judge C. T. Rippe spoke on "Common and Civil Law" at the dinner meeting of the National Business and Professional Women of Torrance Tuesday evening, and gave a very interesting discussion of the fundamental differences of the two branches.

According to Mr. Rippe, all but two or three nations of the world operate under the common law which is an outgrowth of customs and usages of the old Saxons and has been used for centuries in England and from there spread to other progressive countries. Only one of these United States, Louisiana, has the civil law for its code. Mexico, and one or two other foreign countries operate under the civil law, which Mr. Rippe described as a code of repression rather than of advancement.

At the time California was admitted as a state, the United States Senate conducted an exhaustive study of the fundamentals of the two codes, to determine which was better suited to the character of the new state, and the decision was in favor of the common law as better adapted to the needs of a progressive, aggressive group of citizens.
