outlined why his corporation has faith in the Pacific coast.

"Realizing the possibilities of this wonderful country," he con-tinued, "United States Steel wisely decided to acquire the property of Columbia in 1930 so as to be able to enlarge the steel producing capacity of this company to meet the ever-growing demands for steel in this territory."

"With your permission I shall give a brief resume of our partici-pation in the development of the steel industry on the coast."

Irvin then told of the purchase by American Steel & Wire Co. of the old Washburn and Moen Co. in 1900 and the construction of the present San Francisco plant in 1903.

"Selling Agency Formed" "In the early years of this cen-tury," he remarked, "the products of the other subsidiary manu-facturing companies of the corpora-tion, such as American Sheet and Tin Plate, Carnegie Steel, Illinois Steel, Tennessee Coal and the American Bridge Co. were sold here through independent branch offices and agencies."

"In 1911 the U. S. Steel Products Co., Pacific coast department, was formed to better serve the coast trade."

"Sales offices and warehouses, carrying large assorted stocks of all steel products, were maintained at San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland and Seattle."

"Columbia was started in 1910 as a steel foundry, located at Pittsburg, California. This de-velopment was due to local inter-ests being concerned with the pro-duction of steel castings to meet the requirements of the gold dredging industry in the Sacra-mento valley."

One 15-Ton Furnace "The plant originally had one 15-ton basic furnace. In 1913 the first unit of the rolling mill was added to meet demands for re-enforcing and small merchant bars."

"In 1923 additional open hearth furnaces were installed, together with a rod mill, wire and nail mills and a sheet mill department. A tin plate mill was constructed and put into operation in 1929."

"In 1925 Columbia purchased the Torrance plant, near Los An-geloes, which was originally built in 1916 for the manufacture of merchant steel bars, structural shapes and steel castings."

"A sheet mill unit was installed in 1926. Last year, improvements were made in this plant for the production of high grade sheets, such as used for automobile bodies, hoods and fenders, refrig-erator parts, enameling, locker and furniture stock."

Told of Utah "In Utah, Columbia built a blast furnace and by-product coke plant and put same in operation in April, 1924. This company has acquired iron ore, coal and other properties in Utah to supply the raw materials."

A new course, in business man-agement, is being offered to the students of Narbonne for the first time this semester. This course, which is taught by Miss Mason, will follow a term of salesman-ship and makes it possible for a student to obtain a major in commercial studies.

The aims of the course are: First, to acquaint the student with certain fundamental principles that are requisite for organizing and managing a business; second, to offer a reasonable solution of the common problems of business management; third, to encourage young people to think of business as a field that presents great possibilities for constructive, and to teach them, therefore, to ap-preciate the importance of sound business knowledge; and fourth, to open a field rich in material for future study.

The text used is Fundamentals of Business Organization and Management by Cornell and Mac-Donald.
