(1) Members will be selected and promoted only after competitive examinations, both physically and mentally. (2) Promotions must come up from the lowest ranks, no ranks being skipped. (3) Physical qualifications must not be less than that required for recruits for the United States Army. (4) A probation period of six months must be served, before appointments become permanent. (5) Discipline and efficiency will be assured because the Chief of each department is given absolute control over his department, including the discharge of employees. (6) Dissatisfaction among employees will be eliminated as they are assured of promotion if they merit the same. (7) Political and religious affiliations or beliefs have no bearing on the selection or promotion of employees—merit being the sole qualification. (8) Stability of employment assures greater efficiency and interest on the part of the employee, because he knows that if he fails in either particular, there will be others eligible for the job and he may be discharged therefore. (9) Drunkenness on duty is absolute ground for discharge. (10) No employee can be discharged for purely political reasons, thus assuring the retention of efficient employees.
