

Auto Parts Firm Opens This Week At 1216 El Prado

Modern Machine Shop Installed, Complete Stock of Parts On Hand

Of particular interest to garage men and other automobile mechanics is the announcement made this week by C. M. Johnson, of the opening of the Torrance Auto Parts, 1216 El Prado. In addition to carrying a complete stock of parts and automotive supplies, the new firm has a modern machine shop in charge of an expert mechanic, and is equipped to render such services, as reboring cylinders, fitting and aligning rods, grinding and finishing pistons, tuning and installing fly-wheel gears, and turning brake drums for both passenger cars and trucks.

Mr. Johnson, who is the principal owner and manager of the Torrance Auto Parts, was formerly wholesale manager of the Goodrich Rubber Company at Long Beach, and more recently has been a partner in the firm of Covey & Johnson at Compton, well-known auto parts concern.

Associated with Mr. Johnson at the Torrance Auto Parts are O. E. Stadden and G. T. McDonald. Mr. Stadden is an expert mechanic who for many years was with the Jans Piston Company of Los Angeles. For the past two years he has been in charge of the machine shop of Chanslor-Lyons of Los Angeles. This long experience has qualified him to successfully solve practically any mechanical problem, and local garage men will welcome the convenience of having his services close at hand.

Mr. McDonald will be in charge of files, and comes to Torrance from Hookway-Harlow & Phillips of Santa Ana, where he was engaged in similar work.

All three executives of the Torrance Auto Parts are moving to 1216 El Prado street in their new home, which was recently purchased by Mr. Johnson.

Special Feature Planned For Annual Fair At Pomona, May 12

"Girls in the 4-H Club organization in Los Angeles county will have the opportunity to exhibit cakes and pies as a special feature of the third annual 4-H Club Fair to be held at the fair grounds in Pomona on Saturday, May 12," states J. L. Millar, assistant farm advisor.

This year the girls enrolled in club work are going to have an opportunity to demonstrate how good they are as cake and pastry makers.

Kathryn Nobles of the Woodrow Wilson 4-H Club of East Pasadena, who will be in charge of the cake department, states that the girl making the highest prize winning cake will be awarded a silver cup, and ribbons will be given to those who qualify in the first three places in each class for both cakes and pies. The following classes are open for entry by the girls:

- 1.—Angel food cake; 2.—Fruit cake; 3.—Chocolate cake; 4.—Plain white cake; 5.—Sponge cake; 6.—Devil's food cake.

The pie department is in the charge of Genevieve Dutcher, Winnetka 4-H Club at Canoga Park. "The pie department," states Miss Dutcher, "is offering some attractive premiums, so the girls will miss a real opportunity if they do not enter in this contest." Classes for pies are as follows:

- 1.—Fruit pie; 2.—Lemon pie; 3.—Chocolate pie; 4.—Berry pie.

All cakes and pies, after being judged, will be sold with the proceeds going to the club member.

Western Avenue Viaduct Widening Starts Next Week

The work of widening the Western avenue viaduct over the Pacific Electric tracks just south of Imperial highway will be started next week, according to the county road department.

Award-of-the contract was made by the board of supervisors this week to the Atlas Construction Company, on its low bid of \$42,000. Accompanying the recommendation of Road Commissioner George Jones was a communication from C. M. Sweetser, district engineer of the federal highways, concurring in the recommendation.

This is a PWA project, one of four of 17 applications to be actually put through. The Public Works Administration made an outright grant of 30 per cent of the cost, and the supervisors contributed the remainder from gasoline tax funds.

San Fernando Plan Awaits Official Order From Jensen

Authority to extend the so-called San Fernando plan of treating indigent sick to every community throughout the county with the exception of downtown Los Angeles and Alhambra, today awaited merely the signing of an order by Earl Jensen, superintendent of charities.

The plan has been worked out by Arthur J. Will, deputy assistant superintendent of charities. It was learned today at the Hall of Records. Approval of the board of supervisors to make the plan county-wide is not necessary, it was explained.

Under the plan, persons in need of medical attention would contact their district relief office and be directed to the social service worker at the nearest district health center. If investigation substantiated need of treatment and inability to pay a private doctor, the person in need would be given an order for five visits. Additional visits would require a new authorization.

The downtown Los Angeles district is served directly by the General hospital, while Alhambra residents are strongly opposed to the plan, and have expressed this to the board of supervisors.
